LIVESTOCK

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 25—Offerings on the two principal livestock markets today totalled 13,381. Cattle receipts were 1,725. Cattle trading was at a standstill and sales up to mid-forenoon amounted to less than 50 head.

Trading receipts were 1,925. Today's trading on real calves was estimated to be steady. Grass calves were a shade easier. The bulk of the good calves brought \$6 to \$8.50 with a couple of choice veals bringing \$7. Medium good quality calves were sold for \$5.50 to \$6.75 with common to medium quality calves from \$2.75 to \$5.50. Good heavy veal calves were slow sellers at \$3.25 to \$4. Grass veals ranged from \$1.50 to \$3.50 with the bulk between \$1.75 and \$2. Good and choice veal calves, common and medium \$2.75 to \$5.75; grass \$1.50 to \$2.25.

Sheep receipts were 8,624. The standard quotations lambs was \$7.75 for good ewes and wethers. Culls and bucks were discounted \$2 per cwt. A couple of small lots or buck lambs brought \$4.75. Sheep were mostly \$1.50 to \$2 with a range of \$1 to \$2.50. Ewes \$1 to \$2.50; lambs, good \$5.75; common \$3.75. Hog receipts were 2,210. Hogs were easier. Sales were slow at \$6.75 to \$7 for hams and butchers. Selects brought \$1 per hog premium. Hovies \$6.25 to \$6.50. Extra heavies \$5.75 to \$6. Lights \$5.25 to \$5.75, and sows were from \$4 to \$5.50, according to quality.

Currency

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, Sept. 25—Foreign exchange markets were jumpy today for price movements were not wide. British and gold standard currencies were easier in reaction to last week's abnormal strength. The pound sterling moved within a range of 2 1/2 cents and closed at \$4.74 1/2 for a loss of 3/4 cents. The opening quotation was \$4.78, an overall night loss of five cents, but later the pound turned firmer. The last price of the pound sterling was 3-1/8 at 97 11-16 cents. This represented a premium on United States funds of 2 1/2 per cent. The French franc declined .09 1/2 of a cent at 5.97 cents which brought the gold value of the United States dollar up to approximately 67 1/4 cents from 67 3/4 cents Saturday.

PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 25—Prices of eggs, which last week registered gains of as much as seven cents a dozen, firmed again today, fresh extras advancing another cent a dozen and other lines remaining unchanged. Graded shipments in carlots or less of extras became 30 to 31 cents, with firsts at 24 to 25 cents and seconds at 16 cents, for Ontario. Egg receipts totalled 482 cases.

No 1 grade butter eased 1/4 of a cent a pound selling at 19 1/2 to 20 cents for calots or less. The easiness in the local market was induced by the lowering of the Eng. L's market and a further drop in sterling. Receipts were 331 boxes. The cheese markets held steady at last week's close. Being quoted at 1 1/2 to 1 1/4 cents a pound for Ontario and a quarter of a cent less for Quebec. A total of 5,591 boxes was offered for sale. New Quebec potatoes remained at 80 cents per 90 pound bag. Minard's Linnent removes stains.
