LIKE SHORNCLIFFE

Mr. Angus A. McMillan, of Wood Islands, has received the following letter from his son Charles McMillan, "A" Company, 105th Battalion:

Lower Diggate Camp, Shorncliffe, Eng., Aug. 13, 1916.
Dear Father: I thought I would drop you a line to let you know that I am fine, and I like this place now. Well, father, we are pretty busy every day drilling, but we are going to get a pass pretty soon. I think I will go to London.

The war is not going to last long now by what I am hearing, and we get the news direct every day. I heard that the Battery was broken up, is it true? We are going to stay as one unit, I think, and I hope so, anyway, as very often one has been broken up and drafted. I saw Archie McDonald's son, from Pleasant Valley the other day. He is in the hospital here.

It is an awfully pretty place here, as there is a lot of old castles and old buildings, and a church, not far from here, that is a thousand years old. There are flying machines over our heads nearly all the time. There is also an awfully pretty beach close to us, and a place called Folkestone. This is an awfully old-fashioned town. It was there yesterday, as we had the afternoon off. I used to hear them say that things were cheap in England, but I don't think they are. I bought a pair of socks and they cost me four shillings, that is four cents short of a dollar.

We had quite a time when we came here first (earning the money, but we are getting on to it now. Well, I guess I will have to stop for this time. Give my love to all. From your son, Charlie,

**A SOLDIER'S LIFE
IN ENGLAND**

The following are extracts from a letter from Lieut. Clifford Traillor to his sister in Emerald, I write: Dear Sister:—It is 10 a. m. Wednesday, and from my favorite perch on some boxes, I am enjoying the privilege of writing a few lines to you. It has been a lovely morning, but just now the rain began to pour down, and they tell me, they expect it to continue for at least 3 weeks, it being the first we've had since we came.

Lieut. Morris and I are on duty as reserve picket officers. With about 50 men we are watching for raids. Morris is in the tent with me while I write. He is going to join the aviators. We do not expect any raids. The (Germans) know better than to come where the Canadians are. They made a raid on Dover (which is about 8 miles from here) at noon 3 days ago. It has been the first attempt in daylight. The British air ships which are quite numerous here at present are continually on the "watch."

I am going over to Scotland and from there to Ireland in the near future. Sorry I didn't get the add. of some of our Highland consanguinity or Irish Chiefs. We are about 1 1/2 miles from Seabrook town and about 15 miles wide from Folkestone. Folkestone is a city of 40,000 a very pretty summer resort with some grand hotels, a great many of which have been turned into hospitals.

We are in Kent county and the scenery along the English Channel is beautiful. I think the natural beauty of the country is grand. The roads are all cement, but much narrower than our public roads. The people are engaged for a great part in sheep raising. The Shepherd on the hillside with his flock. Little farming is done here.

I saw by the paper where Mr. Duvau was in the hospital in France. I hope his wounds are slight.

The great number of wounded and disabled soldiers together with the great female army here, gloomily remind us of "war."

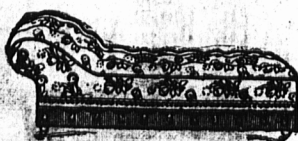

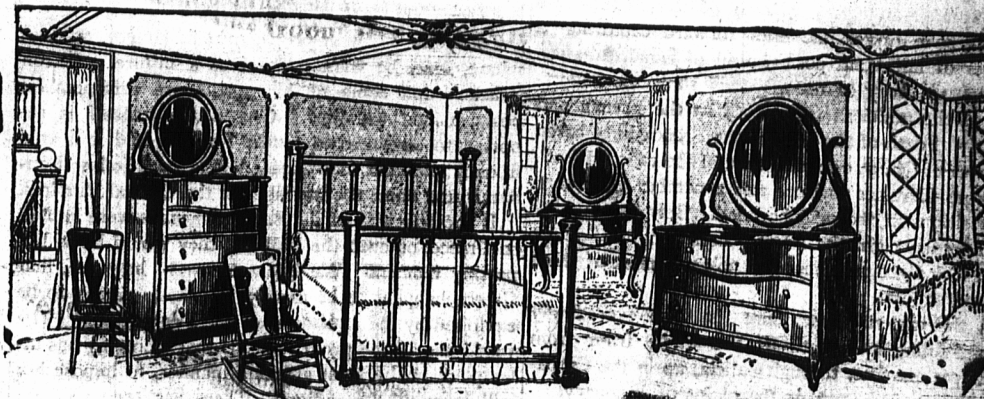
