FREE CODFISH DID NOT REDUCE PORTO RICE PRICE

HALIFAX, Jan. 24—J. E. Woods, who has just returned from five weeks' visit to Porto Rico, says the island is prospering. He mentions an interesting fact showing that tariff reduction does not necessarily mean cheap cost of living. Lunenburg, Mr. Wood says, supplies 95 per cent. of the dry codfish used in the island. Hitherto the duty was \$1.50 per pound. This duty was removed by the Wilson-Underwood bill. The consequence is that the price to Porto Rico was made just 1c. per pound more by the Lunenburg exporter, so that the removal of the duty made no difference whatever. Free food made not one iota lower the cost of codfish to the consumer in Porto Rico. Free codfish did not reduce the cost of living.

FOX ENQUIRIES.—Mr. J. B. McCready, Publicity Agent, has received from a Mr. Rombough, of Baltimore, a gentleman who was in Prince Edward Island some time ago a letter in which he states that since his return home he has been busy advertising the Island and its black fox industry and has sent three or four thousand dollars to be invested. Another letter Mr. McCready has received from Denver, Colorado, from an Islander resident there. The writer asks for literature and information on the black fox industry, and states that the "stories" that are told out there are regarded by some as creations of the imagination. To this anxious enquirer the Publicity Agent has forwarded such information as will give him an adequate conception of the proportions of the great business of the Island. Another man belonging to Winchester, Mass., begs to be furnished with the names of two or three companies "that have stock for sale and are managed by good men." His letter too has been dealt with. A Mr. W. H. C. Rutven, of Alliston, Ontario, says he is breeding foxes up there of the Dalton and Raynor strain, and he solicits advice concerning the registration of stock. At present, he states, the people of Ontario are not aware of the vast difference that exists between the pure-bred stock of Prince Edward Island and the wild stock captured in Ontario and the North West Territory. "But Ontario is beginning to realize the great possibilities of raising foxes," and therefore he wants specimens of registration papers and so forth. All these letters, which are addressed to Mr. McCready with unflinching frequency, speak more eloquently than anything else of the great universal fame of Prince Edward Island's large and important industry.
