THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

A sarcastic writer not long ago advanced the proposition that instead of being generally supposed the "mother of Parliaments" the historic Assembly at Westminster had degenerated into the position of "grandmother of parliaments" and a glance at its deliberations shows that it debates for hours over the most trivial matters which belong properly to the parish councils which more important things are neglected. The Imperial Parliament has apparently set its face against the principle of Home Rule for various divisions of the Three Kingdoms in local affairs. The Press in speaking of the question ventures the opinion that "its own conduct of affairs affords the strongest argument in favor thereof." In Canada it did not take a year and very little discussion when the matter was mooted in Parliament to call into existence "Victoria Day". In Great Britain it appears the government is so afraid of its own shadow that it hesitates to follow the example its great transatlantic Dominion has set it. Unlike that Dominion the mother does not seem to be mistress in her own house, but fears factions and cliques and combinations. A strange example of this is brought to light in a cor-

respondence published in the Times between the Minister of Education, Lord Londonderry and Lord Meath on the subject. It will be remembered that, at the Coronation period the oriental princes and some of the representatives from other possessions pressed the subject on the government and Lord Meath has asked the minister to take some action to encourage the universal establishment in the State-aided schools of an Empire Day (if possible on May 24th; the birthday of the late sovereign), on which occasion the scholars should take part in exercises of a patriotic character for, say, some two hours in the morning, the remainder of the day, being kept as a holiday. It will be seen that all that is asked is not, as with ourselves a day, but two hours only. But the "godness of red tape" has shown herself too powerful to be readily dethroned, and we find Lord Londonderry responding in very awe struck strains. He writes: "It is at present hardly possible. . . . It is particularly in regard to the assembly of the children for the two hours' celebration that we foresee difficulties. In regard to the proposed official school holiday on May 24—which I take not to be the specially characteristic part of your scheme—we propose to wait to see whether the legislature will approve a general public holiday on that date." The mention of the Prince of Wales to his countrymen—"Wake Up"—after visiting the possessions—and seeing their progressive tendencies in commercial matters may, it would seem, with some advantage be heeded in domestic and social matters as well.

A rumor has gained currency that the Anglo-French commission for the delimitation of the boundaries between the Niger and Lake Tchad, in West Africa, is in hopeless disagreement, says the Montreal Witness. It has been suggested that the best way of settling the dispute would be for Great Britain to concede the claims of France, on condition of France resigning her claims and foothold on the coast of Newfoundland. It is stated in Paris that the French Government would not be averse to such a settlement, as it is felt that the progress of events in North America must in a few years render the French position in Newfoundland untenable. Britain would thus give France a much-coveted territory, which is perhaps of small value to the British in comparison with closing forever of a long-standing and constant source of irritation as well as a vexatious barrier to the development of a much more important section of the empire. It would also remove one of the greatest obstacles to the entry of Newfoundland into the Canadian Confederation, open a rich country to colonization and commerce, and put an end to the illicit whiskey trade which is a curse to the Gulf coasts and shores of the St. Lawrence. Some such solution of the French shore question has been often suggested.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 7.—Advices by mail from China tell of the loss of the steamer Sanf Leong, off the China coast. The vessel, which was bound from Kangoon to Amoy and embarked 300 Chinese at Singapore, is believed to have been lost in a typhoon with all on board.
