The outward cargo by the Minto, from this City, this morning will include four hundred bags potatoes for Boston; one car potatoes for Halifax; three cars oats for Pictou; four cars mixed freight and one horse for the mainland.

The warmest temperature registered yesterday was thirty-six degrees above zero, at nine a. m. it stood at thirty-two above and at nine p. m. thirty-two above also. The coldest recorded the previous night was thirty-one above.

The following shipping news from Halifax will be interesting: The Bonavista arrived in Halifax Wednesday from Lunenburg. Manchester shipper in port. The s.s. Colan and A. W. Perry are both loading at Deep Water.

The Minto arrived in this port yesterday morning at ten thirty with twenty five passengers. The cargo included two cars seeds, two cars of flour and a large amount of mixed freight. The Stanley got into port on the previous night shortly before ten, although it was understood she had laid to for the night as inadvertently reported.

Captain John Ritcey, of the steamer Wasie, has returned from North Sydney. He went on the ore laden steamer Wedagesk as pilot. For some days he was unable to make port on account of the ice, but he finally succeeded in getting her there. He has now taken charge of his own steamer, which is ready to sail at once for North Sydney.—St. John Star. The Wasie is well known among shippers in this Province.

The steamer Strathorne has had her engines put in position and she is now ready to sail on her first trip to Cape Breton and Prince Edward Island ports. Her first trip, to be made on Monday, will be a special one, calls being made at Port Hastings, Harbor Bouche, and one or two other places. The regular ports of call will be Port Hastings, Harbor Bouche, Port Hood, Mabou, Inverness (landed at Mabou), Margaree, Eastern Harbor, Souris, P. E. I., Georgetown, Montague and Cardigan. The calls to all but the last three places will be made weekly. The last three ports will be visited fortnightly.—Halifax Herald.
