### TOO MANY RISKS ON SCAFFOLDS

TORONTO, Ont., July 12.—Too many chances are being taken by workmen in this country," declared Mr. J. W. Doggett, the business agent of the Amalgamated Society of Carpenters and Joiners, to The News at the Labor Temple to-day in discussing the verdict rendered by the jury at the inquest into the death of James Belshaw, the painter, who fell from a scaffold while engaged in the work of painting the Exhibition Grand Stand.

ON ONE NAIL OR SIX.

"The workmen here do not seem to care whether they are working on one nail or half a dozen," Doggett continued. "It is impossible for the City Building Inspectors to watch every job, and it is up to the workmen finally to look out for their own safety which they sometimes fail to do. The men who take too many risks."

"At the last annual convention of the Trades and Labor Congress, held at Fort William, a resolution was introduced in an attempt to bring about such legislation to prevent the great loss of life through improper scaffolding and a Scaffolding Bill has been passed by the Provincial Government," he said, "but it may not come into force for some time yet. This is something we have been after for years."

"Do you ever warn the workmen that the scaffolds are dangerous?" he was asked.

"Every day I see men at work on weak boards and improperly constructed scaffolds," he replied "and I always warn them in order to save accidents. You see we give accident benefits in our society, and I am on the lookout to save money for the society as well as to save the workmen from injury."

An official of the Painters' Union was emphatic in his declaration that there weren't half enough inspectors and what's more," he said, "the inspectors don't know their work."

"Belshaw was not a Union man and he may not have known much about painting or climbing, but I do know that the foreman of the job was no painter and should not have been in charge of the men on the grand

stand.

DOING TWO MEN' WORK.

"It is very probable," he continued, "that Belshaw was being rushed. He was trying to do two men's jobs, and in the hurry probably neglected to take the usual precautions. Two many chances are frequently taken by the men either through ignorance or because they are being rushed."

"The scaffolding is the biggest part of a great many jobs. Often it takes longer time to erect or hang the scaffolds than it does to what is required to be done, and so things may be done in a slipshod manner. The experienced men are not likely to meet with accident, however, but the greenhorns need to be watched."

GOOD WORK AT SHEA'S

"There was one job in this city that was done right. And it was in the charge of Yankee contractors. The job I refer to was Shea's New Theatre. Scaffolds in that building were so constructed that the boards were as tight and as level as the floor you are standing on. There was no chance of a workman falling except down the hoist-well which was protected as much as it could be. None but union labor was employed, and there wasn't the semblance of an accident."

"I don't believe that this Belshaw was weak from hunger," he said, "if he was in such a state he could never have climbed the scaffold, and besides the smell of the paint would have made him sick."
