Important Train Changes Effective From May 24th

(EXCEPT SUNDAY)

DOUBLE DAILY SERVICE TO MAINLAND IN EFFECT. Trains leave Charlottetown at 6.45 A.M. and 10.15 A.M. Roll Back Inhabitants In Italy

LONDON, May 25 (AP)—Heavy forces of Allied planes pointed at Axis Europe, again raised the odds amid accumulating evidence that inhabitants of the enemy's Mediterranean islands and the toe of the Italian boot are being driven back by the British and American air units based in Africa.

Medium bombers, with an escort of Spitfires, again raked the oft-battered enemy airfield at Abbadeville while separate fighter squadrons made supporting sweeps over other areas in northern France. Two bomber and two fighters were lost in the day's operations.

Last night's operations in western Europe were confined to small-scale intruder patrols over northern France by B.A.F. fighters as British and Canadian heavy bombers remained in their hangars following their unprecedented assault on Dortmund Sunday night.

The bomber and the civil population of the Sardinian capital, Cagliari, was announced by the Rome radio, which broadcast an emergency decree placing all workers in factories and military works in Sardinia and Sicily under military control.

The broadcast was recorded here by Reuters news agency, which also reported a Zurich dispatch saying refugees are streaming northward from many towns in Italy's toe and the Mediterranean islands.

Thousands of them already have reached Rome, the dispatch said.

Pressure On Price Ceiling To Be Greater

OTTAWA, May 25 (CP)—Donald Gordon, a Prices Board chairman, said today before the National War Labor Board that he expects pressure on Canada's economic stabilization program will increase this year and unless wage rates and farm prices are maintained there is danger of the price ceiling breaking.

Mr. Gordon appeared before the board on invitation, in the course of its general inquiry into wage relations, wages and the cost of living bonus.

The board today resumed hearings in the inquiry and in addition to hearing Mr. Gordon received briefs from Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. of Canada Ltd., of Trail, B. C.; the workmen's cooperative committee of Consolidated Mining and C. E. Rice of Toronto, appearing as a private citizen.

Mr. Gordon read a brief, and tabled with the board a number of appendices giving statistical and other information. He dealt largely with the relationship between wage levels and price control.

"The two major cost factors which can make or break the price ceiling are the wage rates and farm prices," he said.

Wool Marketing

Registered Wool Warehouse Number 18 has been established in the foot of Prince Street, Charlottetown. This warehouse, operated under the Canadian Wool Board, Limited and registered in the name of the Prince Edward Island Sheep Breeders' Association, will be open to receive wool on Tuesday, June 15th. Wool should be shipped care of Wool Grading Station, Charlottetown, Freight Collect. An advance of 22 cents per pound will be made on all wool of satisfactory quality and properly prepared for marketing. The balance will be paid when wool is graded.

Wool fleeces should be packed in old but clean packing, each fleece tied separately with paper string and properly tagged with the name and address of the owner. Be sure the tag is attached both within and without your sacks. Deductions will be made for wool tied with binder twine.

BONUS ON CLEAN WOOL

In support of the Sheep Expansion Programme and to encourage cleaner wool production, the Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture will pay a BONUS OF FOUR CENTS per pound on all standard grades of Canadian Fleece Wool when the individual clip is PROPERLY PREPARED AT TIME OF SHEARING. Payment of the bonus will be made direct to the Grower through the Provincial Department and only against the Certified Stamp of Approval placed upon the Wool Grading Statement by the Registered Warehouse through which the wool passes.

HOW TO SECURE THE BONUS

Any Grower may qualify by observing a few simple rules when shearing his sheep:

1. Shear sheep only when fleeces are dry and keep shorn wool from getting damp or wet.
2. Remove all Heavy Tags and Dung Locks before tying each fleece.
3. If burrs are present only on the underside of the fleece, remove all such Burrs before tying.
4. Remove any neck or back sections of fleece known to be heavy with chaff, seeds and straw—or shake out the chaff as much as possible before tying each fleece.
5. Keep the short, hairy leg and face clippings separate. Avoid rolling them in with the fleece. Keep fleece intact.
6. Tie with paper twine, keeping shorn side and shoulder portions on outside. With small clips, a good method is to spread fleece, shorn side down, on a clean surface, fold in sides and roll neatly from britch to neck.
7. Pack separately all tags, Burry Bellies, Chaffy portions and Hairy Leg and Face Clippings. Pack any Grey, Black or Brown Fleeces separate from the white.
8. For Careful and Safe Bonus Appraisal make certain that your 1943 clip reaches Registered Wool Warehouse operated by the P. E. I. Sheep Breeders' Association.

THE BONUS WILL NOT BE PAID ON

1. Wool tied with Binder Twine or other Sisal Twine.
2. Any Clip received at the Registered Warehouse in poor condition and which has to be cleaned and properly prepared for market prior to grading.
3. Wool received in a Damp, Wet or Musty condition.

This Bonus Payment is definitely designed to produce a cleaner and more desirable wool clip. It applies only to individual clips received free of rejects or with rejects separated as above outlined.
