Large quantities of small pollock are going but the fishermen do not catch them. Cod at present is very scarce. There is plenty of herring in the weirs at Seal Cove, and the fishermen caught as high as five hundred hoghead to one tide, which is selling the weirs once. Weirs at Long Island are also getting herring. The net fishermen at Flag's Cove did well during the week. They caught fifteen barrels a boat a night, and that is considered good fishing. Herring are also plenty on the Rippings, with ice in good supply.

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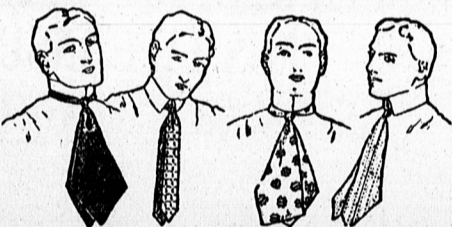

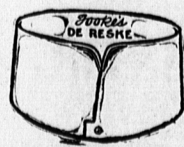

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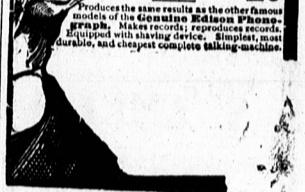
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
