**M. A. A MCLEAN ON PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION**

(Continued from page two.)

The Citizens' Insurance Company vs. Parsons, 7 appeal cases page 96; according to the principle of construction there pointed out the first question to be determined is whether the Act now in question falls within any of the classes of subjects enumerated in section 92 and assigned exclusively to the Legislatures of the province. If it does, then the further question would arise, viz., whether the subject of the Act does not fall within one of the enumerated classes of subjects in section 91 and so does not still belong to the Dominion Parliament. But if this Act does not fall within any of the classes of subjects in section 92, no further question will remain, for it cannot be contended, and indeed was not contended at their Lordships' bar, that if the Act does not come within one of the classes of subjects assigned to the Provincial Legislature, the Parliament of Canada had not by its general power "to make laws for the peace, order, and good Government of Canada," full legislative power.

According to this decision, then, although the Provincial Legislatures had power to deal with prohibition, the Dominion Government had also power to deal with the question, and in this ground, namely, under the authority given to them under section 91 of the British North American Act. A few weeks ago a question came before the Privy Council in England, dealing with insurance and on the 24th of February last the Privy Council decided that section 4 of the Insurance Act was ultra vires. That section deals with licensing provincial insurance companies, and foreign companies doing business in Canada. In the course of that case the question of the right of the Parliament to pass a prohibitory law came up, and as the decision has not yet been published it might be of interest to the House if I read it:

It must be taken to be now settled that the general authority to make laws for the peace, order and good Government of Canada, which the initial part of section 91 of the British North American Act confers, does not embrace the subject-matter of legislation falls within some one of the enumerated heads which follow, enable the Dominion Parliament to trench on the subject-matters entrusted to the Provincial Legislatures by the enumeration in section 92. There is only one case, outside the enumerated class in section 91, in which the Dominion Parliament can legislate effectively as regards a province, and that is where the subject-matter lies outside all of the subject-matter enumerated in section 92. Russell vs. the Queen (7 A. C. 829) is an instance of such a case. There the court considered that the particular subject-matter in question lay outside the provincial powers. What has been said in subsequent cases before this board makes it clear that it was on this ground alone, and not on the ground that the Canada Temperance Act was considered to be authorized as legislation for the

regulation of trade and commerce that the Judicial Committee thought that it should be held that there was constitutional authority for Dominion legislation which imposed conditions of traffic throughout the Dominion. No doubt the Canada Temperance Act contemplated in certain events the use of different licensing boards and regulations in different districts, and to this extent legislated in relation to local institutions. But the fact that the legislatures of the different provinces have passed what are practically prohibitory laws without any let or hindrance, is evidence enough that the provincial legislatures have power to pass prohibitory liquor laws. I do not think that any man has any doubt of that. I should like to know what doubts are in the mind of the hon. member for Kings (Mr. Hughes). What reason can he give why we should appeal to the British Parliament for an amendment to the British North American Act? Even if the Bill which has been introduced by the hon. Minister of Justice does not pass, or should not be considered necessary, we could still achieve our object in another way. We could pass an amendment to the Criminal Code, making criminal for any person to introduce liquor into any province where the sale of liquor was prohibited. I think by virtue of section 91 legislation of that kind could be introduced, and a heavy penalty provided for a violation of the Act. That is in fact what the Minister of Justice is introducing, although in another form. The power by which we can pass such a Bill as the Minister has introduced has been con-
