The A. W. also the violets at the top of the visible spectrum, although the strength and clearness of the reflection varies with each individual skin. But no skin has been found so far capable of reflecting the ultra-violet rays, which, although present in almost all light, vibrate at a rate too high to be visible by the human eye. It is therefore believed that the past evolution of the human skin fore-shadows the existence in the distant future of an ultra-white race, which, in addition to its other capacities, will have a skin capable of reflecting the invisible ultra-violet rays.
