**Pressure to Withdraw American Troops From Manila—Officers Say They Cannot be Spared—Jewish Rabbi Tackles a Burglar.**

 ST. JOHN, N. B., Nov. 15—(Special)  
 —A number of coal miners from Springfield, Illinois, arrived today to work in the coal fields of Grand Lake, Queen's County.

**Steamship direct to Russia.**  
 New York Sun: It is gratifying to hear from our Ambassador at St. Petersburg that the United Steamship Company of Copenhagen is about to try the experiment of running some of its large fleet of steamers, which numbers 120 vessels, direct between St. Petersburg, Riga and New York. Russia consumes in its manufactures nearly 1,000,000 bales of cotton a year, every little of which comes from our Southern fields. That country is now becoming one of the greatest markets for machinery, and we lack only direct communication to enable us to compete successfully in this and many other sorts of products with the manufacturers of Germany and England, whose trade with the Czar's vast domain is rapidly growing.

It costs dear, both in freights and time to transship our Russian-bound goods at Liverpool, Hull, Hamburg and Bremen. This handicap, which has long been an incubus of importance of our trade, not only with Russia but with Spain, most of the Mediterranean countries, nearly every port in Africa and South America and four-fifths of the ports of Asia, will not much longer endure. A day of world-wide commercial activity is dawning brilliantly. We shall have our Hong Kong in the Orient and our great merchant marine to unite us by the shortest ocean routes with the gateways of all the leading countries. Every sign now points to the revival in the near future of our own ocean-carrying trade.

If there is a country in the world that should rejoice to have the fullest facilities for commercial intercourse with us it is Russia. In Russian Europe alone there are 94,000,000 people mostly agriculturists needing machinery and implements so badly that the Government has removed or reduced the duty on some manufactures to encourage importations. We excel in the quality of our ploughs, threshers, locomotives, cutlery and many other articles which Russia needs and must import in large quantities for years till her young industries have reached a more advanced condition, and at the New Port of St. Petersburg large steamers may lay down their freight on wharves where railroad cars are waiting to carry it to all the leading centres of the interior.

**SHOCKING ACCIDENT**  
**Trains Collide on Grand Trunk.**  
**EIGHT WERE KILLED**  
**And Forty Injured—Great Military Conference at Ottawa—Subjects to be Considered—Lord Minto Arrives.**

**OTTAWA, Nov. 15.—(Special)**—The Military Conference opened here today. It will discuss the distribution of the new arms, the system of concentration of troops at central points for special training, advanced instructions for senior officers, instruction in camp duties, rifle practice, first aid medical service, organization for mobilization, creation of an administration department, the abolition of the present tunic and the selection of a garment to take its place, the establishment of a school of gunnery, etc.

Lord and Lady Minto reached here at noon and were cordially welcomed by the cabinet ministers, the mayor and corporation and escorted to Rideau Hall by a guard of honor.

**The Markets.**  
 The market prices in the city remain about the same as when last reported. The attendance at the market yesterday was large, the country people being well represented and business was brisk during the afternoon despite the bad condition of the roads throughout the country.  
 The British egg market continues firm, and shipments of Canadian fresh eggs have fallen off of late. Prices are firm at 8s. to 9s. per 120. The Montreal market continues steady with sales of strictly new-laid reported at 20c. Choice straight candled stock bring 14 to 15½c. and P. E. Island 13 to 13½c.  
 Eggs were retailing in St. John a few days ago for 3½ cents per doz., while at Montreal as high as 50 cents was being paid for fresh-laid stock.  
 There is a good demand at Montreal for sound potatoes, which sell in car lots at 50 to 52c. per bag. Inferior stock brings from 40 to 45c. ex-cars.
