ENJOYABLE DANCE.—About 300 people attended the Golf Club Dance at Summerside on Friday night, which was held in Messrs. R. T. Holman's furniture department. This has a splendid dancing floor and with the music supplied by Dixon's Orchestra made the evening a very enjoyable one. There were a number of people from Charlottetown and other places attending the pleasant function.

MISSION BAND PICNIC.—One of the best picnics of the season was held on the beach at Grand River last Saturday, when the Mission Band of Trinity United Church, Summerside, motored there and spent a very enjoyable afternoon. A newspaper race was a novel feature in the sports programme. An abundant supply of ice cream and other refreshments were partaken of and heartily enjoyed before the children returned home.

RED CROSS DRIVE.—Today (Tuesday) the I.O.D.E. are out on a one-day canvass at Summerside for membership in the Red Cross Society. All that is donated goes into actual use in this province for public health service. This means school inspection of over 8,300 school children; organized clinics for crippled children and adults, with an orthopedic specialist; well organized travelling diagnostic clinics, conducted by specialists in tuberculosis; classes in home nursing and first aid and home visits for pre-school and prenatal instruction. As the proposed canvass last year was not held, the Daughters are expecting a liberal response to their present appeal.

THE SUPREME COURT at Summerside was engaged on Saturday from the opening until 4 p. m. on the continuation of the case of the King against Hubert McDonald, an indictment for wanton and furious driving, causing bodily harm. After the Attorney General had addressed the jury for the Crown and Mr. Heath Strong, K.C., on behalf of the prisoner. His Lordship gave a concise and impartial summing up of the case and the jury retired. They were out a considerable time and returned with a verdict of guilty. This concluded the cases to be heard at this term and the Court adjourned until 2 p. m. on Monday when the prisoners will be sentenced.

MARITIME PROVINCES TRADE COMMISSIONER COMING.—Mr. R. W. E. Burnaby, the Maritime Provinces Trade Commissioner at Toronto and Mr. E. M. Saunders, chairman of the Board of Control of the Maritime Provinces Trade Commission of Ontario, will open a general tour of survey of Maritime industries throughout these provinces by coming direct from Toronto to Summerside, arriving here on Tuesday, July 2nd. They hope to meet the leading shippers and others of Prince County who are interested in the work of the Commission. Interviews will be granted and problems discussed throughout the day with all interested and at a supper being arranged by the Summerside Board of Trade.

—Mrs. Haywood has arrived from Vancouver to spend the summer with relatives on the Island. She is at present visiting in Bedouque.

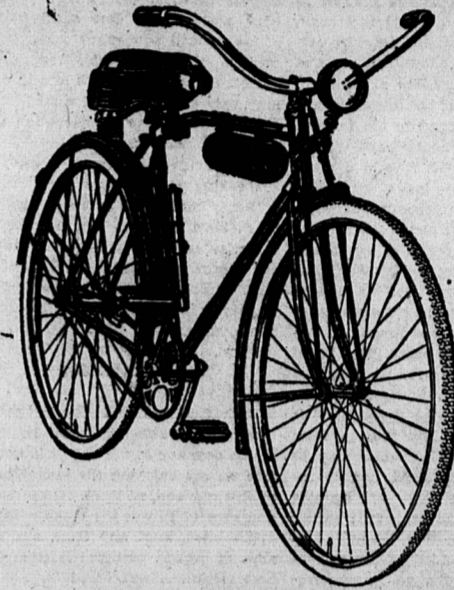
