WOLVERINES CRUSH MONCTON HAWKS 7-4

LENNON IS HERO OF WIDE OPEN GAME

Nicklin Experiments With Lines in Endeavour to Find Scoring Punch.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, Jan. 7.—Halifax Wolverines, 7, Moncton Hawks 4, in a few brief words, tells the story of tonight's inaugural "Big Three" hockey league game here.

The Nova Scotia collection of hockey ivory, not only out-scored the Hawks but outplayed them too, and served notice that they are entering to be a mighty formidable threat in this Allan Cup hunt this coming season.

The return to Allan Cup hockey drew a fair sized crowd of fans, who witnessed wide-open contests that produced some thrills, a good many spills and some good and bad hockey.

FAIL TO "CLICK"

Coach Perc Nicklin with only the tenants of his great machine of last years used various combinations up front in an attempt to get a line that would "click" and would up his evening's experiments by using three centre players on the one line, James pivoting for Bill Miller and Duke McDonald while Frank LeBlanc, was used in the mid-ice zone on the Irvine-Muckle line.

Halifax showed the edge tonight, their raiding parties worked well, the defence blocked and chopped well, and Bubar between the posts also gave a fine show.

For two periods the engagement was fairly close, the middle chucked or ending with the count 3 to 2 in favor of the visitors but in the final period the Wolves tore loose and rammed in no less than four markers, Owen Lennon, flashy left lane man driving in three of the quartette and Lavigne slipping in the other tally.

Monty Muckle, who hails from the same town as E. A. Gilroy, head man of the C. A. H. A. Duke McDonald and Frank LeBlanc, the latest addition to the Hawks were, while Owen Lennon, Frank Lavigne and "Chummy" Lawlor, split the honors for the top spots for the invading "Bluenose Province" pack.

SHOWS PROMISE

Jimmy Innes, local junior, worked on the right lane for a spell tonight and although he lacks finish, shows promise and under the guidance of Coach Nicklin may develop, while Frank LeBlanc, a former member of the Hawks, who last year pastimed in London and who was playing his first game of the current year, also showed up well, stick-handling with rare ability and slammed home one of the four Hawk tallies.

Play opened fast in the first period, Moshier, Shields and Lawlor opposing the James, Irvine, Muckle trio, and at the 2:42 mark, Duke James put the Hawks one up, when he slapped home a pass from Irvine, who in turn had taken the wafer from Monty Muckle inside the Wolverine blue line.

For the rest of the minutes the home team controlled the play and were in close on several occasions but Bubar had the "no sale" sign up and the Hawks could not add to their count.

PROTEST RAISED

Just before the going ended the period, Reg Shields made the score board read Wolves 2, Hawks 1 when he scooped up Moshier's pass in close and heaved the disc into the hem. There was a bit of a protest of this goal as Moshier seemed to be inside the goal crease, but Referee McLeod allowed the tally. A feature of this twenty minutes was the absence of penalties, and Referee McLeod did not wave a single player to the boards, and incidentally last night's fixture was something of a record in that only three penalties were handed out in the entire sixty minutes, Frank Lavigne drawing a pair and Lawlor getting the other.

Lawlor knocked Irvine into the boards to start the middle period and while he was with the lines

LEBLANC TALLIES

At the 17:34 mark Frank LeBlanc put the home crowd into better spirits when he poked in the second Hawk tally. LeBlanc carried the puck down the surface, crossed the blue line and passed to Monty Muckle who drove a hard one on Bubar, the puck rebounding out and LeBlanc pounced on it and lashed it past the astonished Bubar for a clever tally.

Goals were scored thick and fast in the last twenty minutes. Lavigne opened the scoring at the 2:22 mark after another solo effort. He wormed his way in close, circled the net and as Foster went to his knees gently poked the disc between his legs.

Owen Lennon then walked right through the Hawks rear guard and made the score 5-2 for the Wolves. Graham Lavigne was chased by Referee McLeod when he dumped Irvine hard the Hawks "ranged". The puck was lashed up the ice. Duke McDonald raced back, picked up the disc, streaked down towards the Wolves end. He passed Frank Graham and coasted in on Bubar holding a waist high drive into the net for the prettiest goal of the entire night.

SCORES PAIR

Owen Lennon then put the game in the bag with a pair of goals in little over two minutes, the first being a single handed effort while Mickey McGlashen gave him a pass for the last goal for the Wolverines.

Bill Miller scored the last Hawk tally when he scooped up a loose puck in his own territory, worked in around the Halifax rear guard and drove a hard drive into the net, beating a mass of legs and players who had worked around the defence.

Lavigne was penalized near the end of the game and although the Hawks worked hard, they could not defeat Bubar who topped several difficult shots in the final two minutes of the game.

BAER AND JOHNSTON AT LOGGERHEADS

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DETROIT, Jan. 6.—The Detroit Free Press says the breach between Max Baer and the Madison Square Garden Corp., had become as wide "as the Grand Canyon" as the result of a wordy battle between the heavyweight champion and James Joy Johnston, boxing manager of the Garden, when they met here Friday night before Baer's bout.

The Free Press said the argument started when Johnston and Joe Jacobs entered Baer's dressing room to extend congratulations for drawing a big house.

"You say I'm not doing anything to help the fight game. I gave the fight game the greatest boost it has received since Dempsey's time when I knocked out Levinsky at Chicago.

"You are the one who is ruining the fight game. You go around knocking everybody and everything. You're the smart guy.

"You don't want me to fight a double header with Lasky and Hamas," he shouted. "Why? Because you're afraid I'll knock Lasky into your lap?"

"Listen Jimmy, you may have the fighters, the officials and the politicians on your side. But you don't have these."

He held up his tape swathed fist.

"I have these and I'll use them to beat the living daylight out of every fighter you have tied up."

GILROY VOICES SATISFACTION

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, Man., Jan. 7.—Satisfaction at the apparent solution of difficulties within the Maritime Branch was expressed today by E. A. Gilroy, President of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

Mr. Gilroy said he had received no official report from James Wry, President of the Maritimes branch, on the decision of Moncton, Charlottetown and Halifax to have separate teams under the aegis of the Maritimes branch instead of playing commercial hockey. There was a good attendance at the regular monthly meeting of the Y.M.C.A. directors, which was held last evening with the president, Dr. Clark, in the chair.

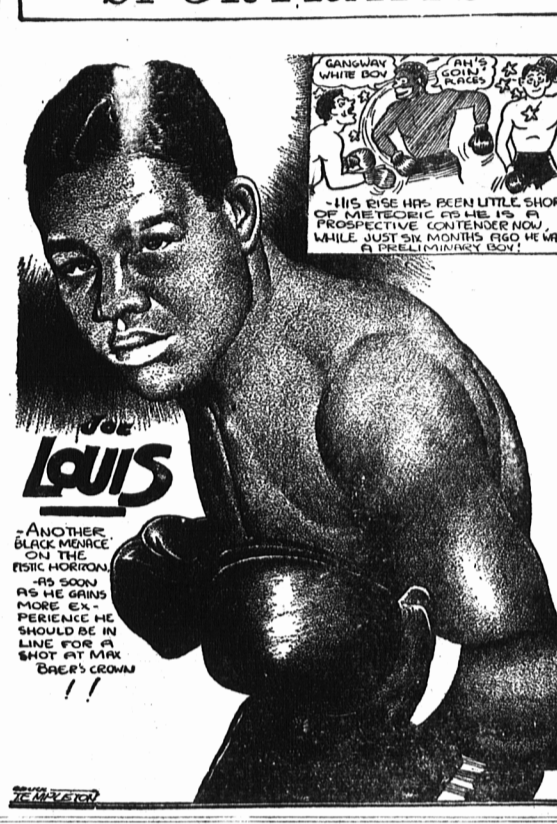

The religious work report presented by Mr. M. J. MacFadyen indicated a growing interest in the Sunday evening service, which in conjunction with the S.C.M. Mr. Claude Smith, reported for the games committee, stated that 26 different teams participated in the bowling program throughout the month and pointed out that plans are underway for the setting up of a new league for the balance of the season, starting on February 1st on the completion of the present schedule. The winning teams now operating will receive recognition in an event being planned for early in February. The treasurer, Mr. W. M. Rowe, presented the report for the month of December and also the auditors report for the last four months of 1934. This report indicated a careful analysis of the finances of the Association and gave encouragement for the future.

The report of the general secretary, Mr. Norville E. Luck, indicated an improvement in the membership situation and referred to the opening of the educational classes during the past week. Up to the present efforts have been directed mainly to the enrollment of classes and the search for students. In connection with the boys work of the Association reference was made to the growing interest in the Saturday evening programs being promoted for community boys. Considerable interest was shown in this phase of the report and the discussion led to consideration of plans for an aggressive program of activities in connection with boys' work.

It was decided to hold a father and son supper rally in the latter part of February. Plans in connection with a boys and girls hobby show were also discussed. Consideration was given to plans for the annual financial campaign of the Association, and it was decided to hold it during the week of the 22nd of April. At the next meeting of the directors definite plans will be drawn up for the handling of the campaign.

JACKSON STILL LEADS N.H.L. SNIPERS

Detroit Ace Line Fast Gaining in Points On Leaf Duo.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—Two members of Detroit's ace line, Cooney Weiland and Larry Aurie, are pressing on the heels of the Toronto Maple Leaf sharpshooters, Harvey Jackson and Charlie Conacher, it was shown tonight in the weekly statistics issued by the National Hockey League.

Red Wings' domination of the United States section of the league, was completely nullified by Weiland and Aurie, Herb Lewis and Ebbie Goodfellow holding the first four places. Weiland and Aurie have 20 points, made up of 9-11-20 and 7-15-20, respectively, while Lewis has 18 and Goodfellow 17.

Harvey's Jackson's lead of the whole league was threatened by Conacher, last year's leader, who tested one point behind Jackson by far the most goals, 17, for a point total of 24 but Conacher has been building up assists to his present mark of 12, with 11 goals.

Red Horner of Leafs continues his "bad man" role with 61 minutes followed by Irving Frew of St. Louis with 44.

Ontario Players Suspended

By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Jan. 7.—The Ontario Government has passed a proclamation to put in force legislation passed at the last session of the provincial legislature making provisions of the Dominion Marketing Act applicable to Ontario, Hon. Duncan Marshall, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, revealed today.

Reason for this action, Mr. Marshall said, was to give legal effect to decisions of the Ontario potato marketing committee. One decision provided for limitation of imports of potatoes from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island into Ontario and another restricted wholesale marketing of potatoes in larger centres to no. 1 and fancy grades.

Gagnon Replies To Shipley

OUT OF THE storm and stress of Maritime hockey arises a team of destiny, the Halifax Wolverines. A well balanced squad featuring speed and ruggedness, they tore through the crippled ranks of the Dominion champions last night for a 7-4 victory. Apparently the Wolves are leaving nothing to chance as they commence their inaugural trip through the "Big Three" circuit. Perc Nicklin, canny coach of the Hawks, however, was not merely interested in the score but through frequent shuffling of players sought out a line that exhibited the necessary scoring punch. Meanwhile the Abbies are seeking a new front line and a defenceman. Three prospects turned out for practice yesterday, Johnny Squarebriggs, Harry Currie and Irvine McKie. Johnny, who turned in a good season with the Brown Hockey Club in New York last year, will assume left wing berth. Harry Currie, junior right winger, will be shifted to centre position to make room for Clarence Steele who arrived in town yesterday, while McKie will likely be alternated on the defence.

NEW YEAR'S DAY RACING "Sir—I wish to draw attention to "Down the Back Street" partially printed in last Saturday's issue. It was in reference to the "steppers" on Great George Street on New Year's Day. The writer was so preoccupied with paying a tribute to the owner of Lusty Frisco that he forgot the horse's name for the time being and called him "Lucky Frisco." Mr. Chandler is a good sport and a thorough gentleman. We all like to see him given credit for having a good horse. Undoubtedly Lusty is "pippin." But what about Heatherbell? Isn't he deserving of more recognition than the passing "Heatherbell and quite a few others, etc." given him in Saturday's write-up? ANY POSSIBILITIES of Max Baer adding an unparalleled chapter to modern heavy-weight boxing history by making a double defence of his championship in the one night were wiped out by Madison Square Garden management. The Garden, which has the champion under contract, can see no reason for Baer appearing two men when they might be sorted out and used for separate gate attractions.

BAER, THE happy-go-lucky titleholder blasted himself out of a good purse by flattening Levinsky recently in Chicago. With Steve Hamas signed to fight Schmeling in Germany and anxious to meet Peterson, the British heavyweight, at Wembley, the outlook is not so rosy for Baer who may have to depend on vaudeville and more shows with brother Budd as a source of revenue while the Garden is deciding on a contender.

BARTS, Jan. 7.—Charles Godfrey, a former leading negro heavyweight fighter who has turned to wrestling of late, tonight thrashed Steve Novotny of Pmanian, in 11 minutes in a one-fall match. Godfrey weighed 264, Novotny 270.

HAMAS OFFERED WEMBLEY BOUT NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—Charley Harvey, veteran manager of Steve Hamas, American heavyweight, boxing title contender, today announced receipt of an offer of \$5,000 (\$25,000) from Sidney Kull, English promoter, for a bout at Wembley the first week in February between Hamas and Jack Peterson, the English champion. Hamas already is signed to meet Max Schmeling, the former titleholder, in Germany in March for a like purse but it is contingent on the ability of Walter Rotherberg, the German impresario, to deposit \$25,000 in a Paris bank by Feb. 1. Since Germany forbids the export of gold that may be impossible of accomplishment. Harvey said he was sticking to the German contract but had written for permission to accept the British offer. Hamas would like to have both bouts.
