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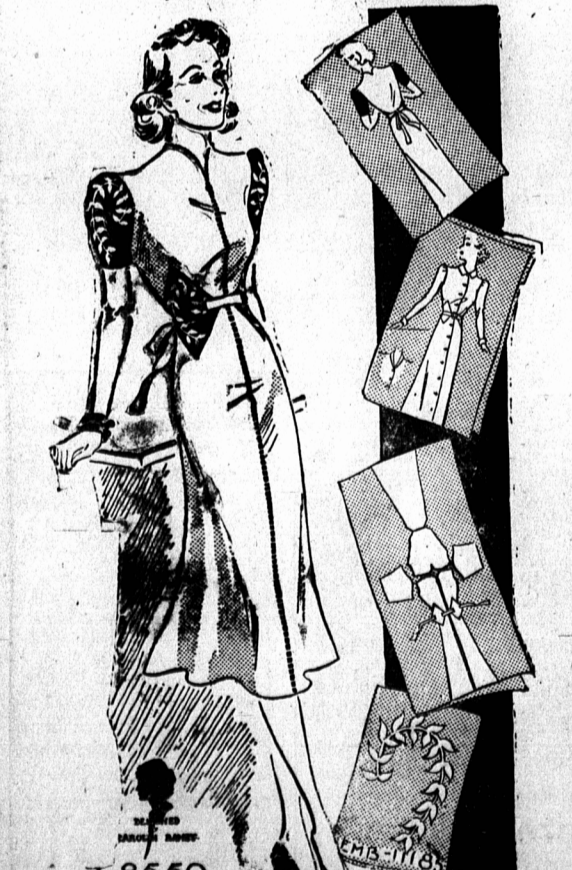

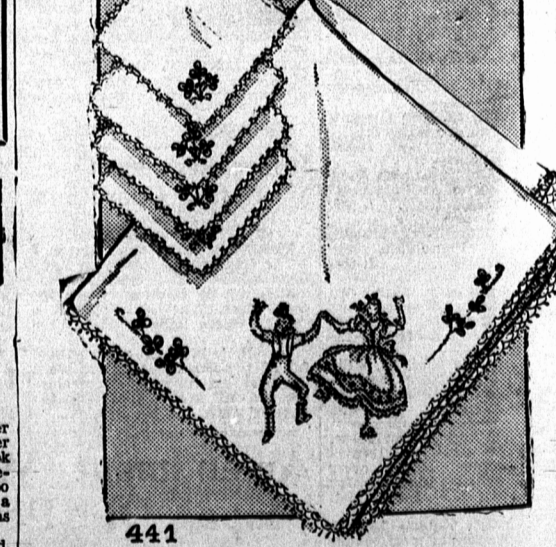
COCOA FLAVORS IN STREET. Steaming hot cocoa flowed down the streets of Bermuda, England, where a fire in a chocolate factory.
