A valued correspondent sends the following. From The Guardian of Sept. 17th I learn that Mr. M. Lamont of Springton, Lot 67, has passed on to the land of immortals, and having been intimately acquainted with him in the past, I shall, with the Guardian's usual courtesy, supply some additional words. Deceased was born in the Isle of Skye and when a youth came to America and settled on a farm in Strathbyn where with few intermissions he passed the rest of his days. Besides rural employments his time in after life was largely taken up by such government works as bridges, wharves and breakwaters; and today not a few of these structures testify to the excellent finish and enduring character of his work. He was for ten years clerk of the Commissioners' Court where he lived, and for an equal length of time he held the office of Commissioner for roads and bridges, both of which offices he voluntarily resigned. Apart from his great natural aptitude for engineering and mechanics, he possessed a mind of extraordinary clearness and vigor which under more favorable auspices could hardly fail of placing him among distinguished men. His early education in English was limited to nine months at school, yet in after years he was well informed on most subjects. He was however an accomplished scholar in the old tongue of the hills. He was kind, genial and hospitable, a general favorite and leading man in the community which will long hold his name in remembrance and which his pure life had done much to brighten and cheer. His wife (Catherine Stewart), together with nine children survive him. I shall close these rambling remarks in the words of another:

"Bright be the place of thy soul!
No lovelier spirit than thine
E'er burst from its mortal control.
In the orbs of the blessed to shine."

Farming With Geldings.

The American plan of farming with geldings, as non-productive as a mule, is a useless expense that should be changed to the adoption of breeding mares, especially in the heavier grades, for geldings, when matured, will be an expensive luxury that farmers can ill afford, however good farm teams they make, when they can use mares that are quite as good at the farm work, and raise a valuable colt each year, as in France, England and Scotland, where the draft horses are raised almost entirely by the farmers, and the maturing geldings and surplus mares are the most important income of the farm. The English Live Stock Journal tells how the English farmers manage: When the foaling season comes, and the working horse strength is weakened through the broad mares being otherwise engaged, their places should be filled up with young animals. The two-year-olds which have not looked through the collar should be taken in hand and put gently to work, and if they are numerous enough to give them half a day each, so that two take the place of one horse, so much the better for the colt and its owner. If there is no plowing to be done they can be put to scuffle or drag on the root land, and on a grass farm the operation of breaking need not be neglected. The colt or filly may be attached to a log of wood—of course, with a rein and man to lead on their side—for a start, then to chain-harrows, which can hardly be used too much on pastures, and in this way be got tractable enough to pull its portion when required in the room of the mare which is nursing a foal to grow on and take its place in the team in due time.
