Visitor to Island Makes Suggestions
Mr. J. W. Mitchell, Mrs. Mitchell and son, Leslie of Chicago arrived in the City this week to spend the summer on their farm at New Bonaventure. The party motored all the way from Chicago and found the roads in splendid shape until they reached Sackville. Owing principally to a heavy rain of the night before the roads both from Sackville to Tormentine and from Borden to Charlottetown were not in good shape. Mr. Mitchell, in an interview with The Guardian strongly recommends the graveling of the road from Borden to the City. In the meantime he insists that the holes in evidence in many places should

be immediately filled and such smoothing as is necessary be done at once. On behalf of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association Mr. Mitchell had interviewed many people in Chicago whom he persuaded to visit Prince Edward Island during the present summer. He fears that if immediate steps are not taken to improve this piece of road his future efforts on behalf of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association will be a failure. Mr. Mitchell, from his experience along these roads suggests that vendors of gasoline should keep a supply of water on hand for the benefit of purchasers of gasoline as in many cases it is found necessary to put in a fresh supply of water en route. He observes that at every gas station along the roads in the United States water was available and also a suitable appliance for putting it into the radiator. Water is cheap but is often very valuable to the motorist and the little convenience of supplying it is always greatly appreciated. Mr. Mitchell's suggestions are well worth making a note of. Prince Edward Island wants the tourist trade and will get its full share of it if these necessary matters are attended to.

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P. E. I. Potatoes Get Big Boost

Mr. William Phillips, Manager of the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways, addressed the Charlottetown Board of Trade in April last, and spent the day in making calls upon a number of business men in company with Mr. P. W. Clarkin. Mr. Phillips stated after leaving Charlottetown on his last visit, he went direct to Charleston, South Carolina, to attend the annual meeting of the National Trade Convention of the United States. He was able to get into touch with parties interested in the importation of seed potatoes from Canada and he was glad to learn from them that the seed potatoes shipped from Prince Edward Island were considered to be the best seed stock imported. Mr. Phillips took the opportunity of pointing out to the interested parties he met in Charleston that what Prince Edward Island and the other Maritime Provinces desired was some reasonable assurance that the efforts now being made to supply the needs of some of the Southern States with a high grade seed potato, would not receive a sudden check owing to possible action on the part of the United States Government in increasing the duty or taking other action that might tend to restrict the trade, particularly after the farmers of Prince Edward Island and other Provinces had made a careful study of seed requirements and had produced the seed stock desired. Mr. Phillips further stated he thought it would be well to bear this important point in mind and that the farmers would be serving their best interests by continuing along the line of mixed farming rather than depend mainly upon the potato crop. Mr. Phillips had a conference yesterday with His Worship the Mayor also with Hon. J. H. Myers, Minister of Agriculture, Mr. W. M. Rowe, President of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, Mr. N. Rattebury, Mr. Tidmarsh, and a number of other parties.

AT THE RAILWAY WHARF.—The Railway Wharf presents a busy appearance these days. Piles are being driven; divers are at work along the sides; cars laden with machinery, etc., are tracked to a convenient position and workmen on every side interested in the work laid out for them. Mr. A. P. Ceretti, of the C. N. R. is in charge of the work. Mr. Ceretti may be mentioned as having six years with the Italian navy, six years with the British navy and seven entering the service of the C. N. R., was employed for seven years with the C. F. R. The work now in hand is the driving of about 200 seventy foot crosstied piles, which are "dead" to the wharf with 1 1/4 inch rods, 100 feet long. These rods reach across the whole width of the wharf from east to west. The rods are run from pile to pile on either side and this serves to strengthen or reinforce the wharf which is faced with concrete. The outfit consists of about ten cars fitted up for blacksmith shop, fitting and sleeping quarters, etc. Mr. Ceretti occupies five cars for his living outfit, sleeping quarters, office, etc. The pile driver and steam boiler machinery are placed on two flat cars which are easily moved along the wharf. A derrick scow is also employed for hoisting piles etc. Possibly the most interesting part of the work, especially to the spectators, is the operations of the diver, who is below the surface drilling holes in the piles and concrete for the reinforcing rods. The drill used is operated by compressed air, which is piped from the C. N. R. shops.
