Two Killed In New Glasgow Explosion

Estimates Return To P.E.I. Growers Of \$2,400,000

Million Dollar Increase Over Last Year In Returns From Island Potatoes Estimated By Financial Post.

The following optimistic survey of the Maritime potato marketing situation appeared in the Nov. 25 issue of the Financial Post, Toronto:

Higher prices and a good crop is the important news from the famous potato growing areas of the maritime provinces.

A survey made by The Financial Post recently, reveals that in the two provinces of P.E.I. and New Brunswick alone, potato farmers will receive something like \$3,000,000 more for their crop this year than last year—an increase of from 100 to 150 per cent on the 1932 returns. Nova Scotia alone of the maritime provinces will harvest a smaller crop this year and even here the substantially higher prices will more than offset the lower volume.

Total crop in P. E. I. and New Brunswick this year was estimated a few weeks ago by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at 9,300,000 cwt. as compared with 7,000,000 cwt. a year ago. The five year average for the period 1928-1930 was 9,970,000 cwt. for the two provinces.

Another French Premier

MURDER IN FORMS CABINET

CAPE BRETON

Four Former Premiers Will Likely Hold Ministries In Chau-temps Cabinet.

(Associated Press)

PARIS, Nov. 27.—(Monday)—Unable to bring into line the diffident French Socialist Party, M. Camille Chauvages early today announced the formation of a new "public safety" cabinet which included four former premiers, with himself as Premier and Minister of the Interior.

Edouard Daladier will continue as Minister of War; Joseph Paul-Boncour as Minister of Foreign Affairs, and M. Albert Sarraut, who headed the third cabinet to fall this year, will be Minister of Marine in the new government.

Socialist Elements

The Chauvages cabinet, like Sarraut's contains purely Radical Socialist elements, leaving out the Socialists and the left Republicans. Political forecasters concede a life of possibly less than a month for the new combine.

13 FOXES STOLEN AT NORTH TRYON

Terrific Blast Rock Business Section Of City

Nephew And Uncle Killed, Woman Almost Buried Alive — Police Unable To Determine Cause Of Disaster.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., Nov. 26.—Cause of a terrific explosion that rocked New Glasgow's business district, killing two men and almost burying a woman alive, remained a mystery tonight as police patrolled the stricken area to prevent looting of damaged stores.

Bodies of Morris David and his nephew, Simon Attis who occupied adjoining stores in the building where the blast originated, had been recovered after firemen and volunteers scoured themselves in menacing flames.

Mrs. David, blown through the front of her husband's store, was in critical condition in hospital, suffering burns, cuts and bruises.

The explosion occurred shortly before midnight on Saturday, Attis had locked up his meat and provision market and entered David's clothing store to chat with his uncle, Mrs. David, waiting for her husband, was standing near the entrance.

Witnesses said a tremendous blast shook buildings all along the street. As glass crashed in half a dozen nearby stores the building owned by David collapsed.

Mrs. David was first notified when flames shot 50 feet in the air above the crumbling structure. Buried in debris, except for her head and shoulders, she was shouting: "Save my husband! Save my husband!"

Just then a steel girder from the building crashed through telephone wires and on top of a car parked on the street.

Flames were spreading rapidly through the ruins.

First on the scene was Douglas Smith, 24-year old bank teller, who rushed to the car and, finding it empty, ran to a fire alarm box a few feet away.

Firemen and people from nearby stores arrived a few minutes after the shock, but flames had already reached Mrs. David. Digging frantically while her hands and face were scorched, firemen released her and she was rushed to hospital, where tonight it was stated she would recover.

Fire apparatus simplified the task of regulars and volunteers as they attacked the ruins in search

Investigate Gangland Killings

DETROIT, Nov. 26.—Slain in the manner of gangland, the bodies of Abe Axler, 34, Detroit public enemy and long known to New York police, and Eddie Fletcher, 33, identified with Axler in underworld activities here since 1926, were found early Sunday in an automobile near the fashionable Bloomfield Hills suburb, 23 miles from here.

Found in Car

The bodies were found in the rear of a car owned by Axler's wife parked on a lonely road. An autopsy indicated the men had been dead 30 minutes. Each had been shot five times.

Sheriff Roy Reynolds of Oakland County said the men apparently had been shot from inside the car as no bullet holes were found in the windows or body.

The victims and their wives occupied apartments at the same address in Detroit. Mrs. Fletcher said that early Saturday evening her husband had left the apartment after remarking "I got to go out."

Both men were reputed members of the "Purple Gang" here and had been taken into custody for questioning on nearly every major crime in the City since 1926.

It was learned authoritatively that the subject of wheat was brought up in the conversations between Maxim Litvinoff and President Roosevelt in Washington last week.

The United States delegates to the parley, which will be presided over by United States Ambassador Robert W. Bingham, left Washington before the conversations on Soviet recognition, but they were expecting fresh information from America before tomorrow's session.

The United States delegation pointed out that wheat could have only been a minor subject in Washington, however, inasmuch as Canada, Argentina, and Australia are fully as much involved as the United States.
