Products From Canada Almost Unknown, Said

CANADA NOT GETTING PUBLICITY ACCORDED TO OTHER DOMINIONS, IS CHARGE

LONDON, Nov. 16.—(By Thomas T. C. Hampton, C. P. Staff writer.)—Canadian trade officials in London are astonished at the statements credited to Dr. Ira Cotnam, member of the Canadian Parliament for Renfrew North, after his return to Canada from a visit to Britain. He was quoted as saying Canadian products were practically unknown in the United Kingdom and Canada was not securing the publicity accorded to other Dominions.

Dealing particularly with Dr. Cotnam's complaint that Canadian apples were not to be found, it was declared today the season's crop had not reached Britain when he was there. Canadian apples at the moment are selling at practically every fruit store in the country and an outstanding feature of last week's Imperial Fruit Show at Birmingham was a display of apples from all Canadian provinces.

DUSSELDORF, Germany, Nov. 17.—This city has been worked to a high pitch of excitement by the activities of a "Jack the Ripper" who has murdered almost a score of young girls recently.

The police have no definite clue to the murderer's identity, but they have received postcards directing them where to look for the corpses of the victims. Most of the cards read "dig there" or "dig deeper," besides containing the location.

STE. JULIENNE, Que., Nov. 17.—In the provincial by-election in Montcalm County, Saturday, Hon. J. L. Perron, Minister of Agriculture, retained the constituency for the Government by defeating his Conservative opponent, Dr. Albert Levesque of St. Alexis, by a majority of 897, according to the latest figures available. Hon. Mr. Perron polled 1861 votes and Dr. Levesque, 864.

While the Liberal Party was pleased with the result of the by-election, the Conservatives rejoiced in the fact that they cut the Government majority of 1927 by about 629 votes.

Hopeful Note For Cancer Treatment

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Though cautious and sober in its terms, a report issued by the Radium Commission today conveys an entirely hopeful note. The commission admits the radium treatment for cancer may ultimately be displaced but at present there is little else available, with the exception of surgery. Radium affords more promise than any other treatment, the report says.

The commission states the patient must show himself for treatment while the ailment is yet in its early stages. "One great point in favor of radium," it goes on "is that its use does not involve the risks and suffering associated with extensive mutilating operations. The operation introducing radium is comparatively slight and while the radium is in position the patient suffers little, if any, discomfort.
