Ryder Cup To Reside In Land Of Its Origin

British Golfers Win Over U.S. Team—Prince Of Wales Spectator As Countrymen Triumph By Six Matches To Five.

SOUTHPORT, Eng., June 27—(C.P. Cable)—Great Britain's blue ribbon golfers, fighting to the very last putt on the home green, today defeated a team of American golfists of the fairway to win the Ryder Cup, emblem of international supremacy.

The triumph was scored by a margin of six matches to five, with one foursome halved.

Two days of the hardest sort of competition in the annuals of the professional team match ended on the rolling sand-dune green in front of the Southport club with nearly 20,000 spectators, among them the Prince of Wales, trying to see the exciting finish in which Syd Easterbrook defeated Denmore Shute and enabled England to keep the trophy in the land of its origin.

It was the steadiness of young Easterbrook's game that turned back the courageous American challenge. Shute came from behind in the last nine to first square the match and then to take

FIGHTERS STOP TRAINING

Sharkey and Carnera "On Edge" As Time of Bout Nears.

NEW YORK, June 27—Two months of the monotonous grind of training ended today for champion Jack Sharkey and his heavy-weight title challenger, Primo Carnera, leaving only the longest stretch of all, the nerve-tearing wait for the starting bell in the big Madison Square Bowl on Long Island Thursday night.

Sharkey closed out the last drill in his camp at Orangeburg with the same gusto that sweeps a football team the day it burns the tackling dummy before the final game.

Carnera, who will outweigh the champion by about 60 pounds, in addition to enormous advantages in height and reach, was in the midst of a slugging match with Arthur Huttick at his camp on Pompton Lakes, N. J., when his manager, Bill Duffy, jumped between them and hollered "time."

The huge Italian, who had already fought two rounds with Harold Mays and another with Huttick, wanted to keep going.

"Nothing doing," said Duffy. "You're on edge. Hold it."

Rovers Win Close Tilt From Falcons

Three-Cornered Tie In Race For City Title And Campbell Trophy

The North-end Rovers jumped into a three-cornered tie for leadership of the City Baseball League last night when they turned back the Falcons bid for their second straight victory, besting the "Birds" 8 to 7.

The game while not productive of either team's best brand of ball had the fans on edge throughout with first one team taking the lead and then the other. The winners scored twice in the opening session, while holding the Falcons scoreless till the third. In this frame the Falcons pushed two runs across the plate to tie it all up. The Northerners scored a run in the fourth and fifth to get back their early two run lead. The losers game to the end scored three times in the sixth on 3 hits and an error to go one up.

The Rovers not to be outdone in their half of the session connected for three safe blows and two Falcon errors to push four runs across the plate, making it 8 to 5.

In the seventh frame, Carbonnell relieving Connors, after striking out the first batter, and forcing the second man to ground out yielded three safe hits, the "Birds" counting twice. The side was retired without further damage and Umpire Walsh called the game with the Rovers still holding one run lead.

Tom McFarlane on the mound for the losers pitched a nice game of ball but poor support with men on the paths proved costly. Connors pitched his usual good game and had the "Birds" well in hand until the sixth when he was touched for three safe blows. Both teams made numerous errors, but said miscues were atoned for by some sparkling bits of fielding.

FIRST RANKING ENGLISH PLAYER IS DEFEATED

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 27—(Canadian Press and Associated Press Cables)—England's no. 1 player, Fred Perry, went down to defeat in the second round of men's singles at the all-England championships today as the veteran South African, Nat Farquharson, pulled the first major upset of the great tennis tournament. Playing stylishly and easily the South African ace won 7-5, 6-1, 2-6, 4-6, 6-4.

ENGLAND TAKES FIRST MATCH

LONDON, June 27—(C. P. Cable) England defeated the British West Indies soundly today, in the first of the season's three cricket test matches, despite a gallant attempt at a comeback by the visitors.

After a catastrophic first innings the West Indies cricketers fought doggedly against the English bowling in an effort to stave off defeat by a full innings but failed, losing by an innings and 27 runs.

More than 11,000 persons at Lord's saw the West Indies go down fighting. Despite a brilliant innings by George Headley, their star batsman who rolled up 50 runs, the West Indies were unable to get more than 172 in their second innings. Added to a dismal first innings total of 97 runs it gave them 269 compared with the English single innings score of 296.

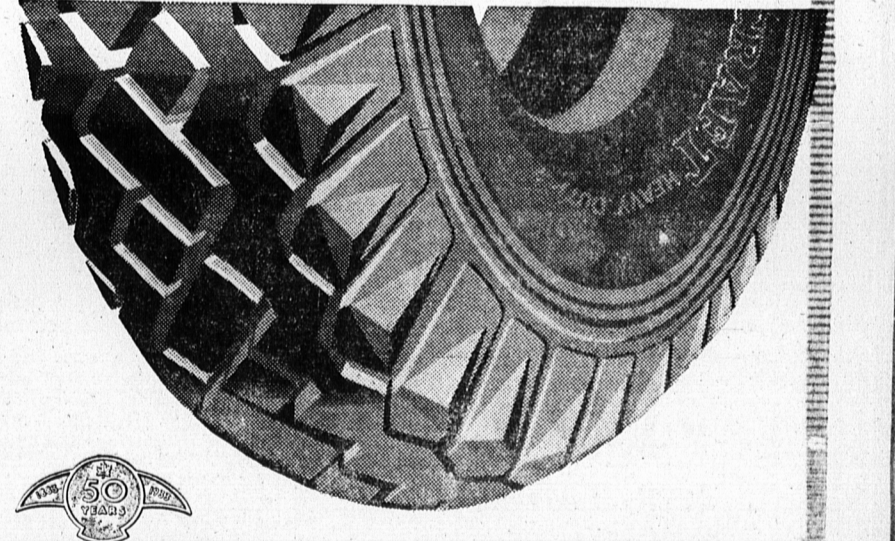
