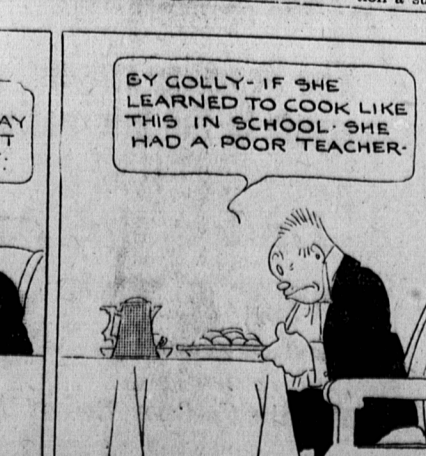

Anti-War Pact To Be Signed On Historic Date

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—The new Franco-American arbitration pact embodying a declaration against war as an instrument of national policy will be signed next Monday the Sesqui Centennial of the first treaty entered into between the two republics.

Word of the final agreement or terms of the new treaty reached the state department from Paris last yesterday. It means fulfillment of the original French desire for signature of the new peace pact on the anniversary date although the Roo Arbitration treaty it will replace does not expire until Feb. 27th.

Signature of the new arbitration treaty means the indefinite postponement of the discussion with the Paris government of the question of a separate treaty renouncing war which grew out of Briand proposals to Washington last year.

Secretary Kellogg has not replied as yet to the last French note stating that the government is best in accepting his counter plan for a multilateral power treaty and re-asserting French insistence on limitation of the wars to be denounced by "wars of aggression."
