**GREEK KING VISITS THE DEVASTATED CITY**

**SALONIKI.**—King Alexander today visited Saloniki and viewed the devastation caused by the recent fire. The King was received by Greek officials and also by General Sarrail the French commander, and Lieut. General Milne, the British commander, and the foreign consuls. After inspecting the burned area and the refugee camps, King Alexander had an audience of Generals Sarrail and Milne. General Sarrail has informed the Mayor of Saloniki that the French Government was sending a contribution of money to aid the people of Saloniki. He also promised that France would furnish tools and materials with which to build temporary dwellings for the people.

The visit of King Alexander made a good impression on the people who frequently cheered him.
