Miss Florence McCabe, 28 Grafton Street has received the following letter in response for the gift of book sent overseas at Christmas with parcels from the C. W. L. Sub-division, Charlottetown:

Lowlands Rd. Blackwater, Nr. Camberley, Surrey 2nd of January, 1943.

Dear Friend— Many thanks for the dear little book The Canadian Soldier, given me as a present at a party that was given for the young school children at one of their barracks.

It had your name and address, so I have written to say, thank you very much for the book. I am 10 years of age, and by the date at the back of the book your age is 14 or perhaps 15 when this letter reaches your home. I hope you will answer this letter as I would like very much to know all about you.

We had a very nice Christmas over here. I hope you did as well. Did you have snow at Christmas? We had not, but a few days after the 25th we had a little, but there is no trace of it left now.

There was not enough to have any fun playing snow-ball fights, but expect we will have more than we want very soon. It is cold enough for it. There has been ice on the puddles every morning. Well I'll go on to say a few more lines about the family. I have three sisters Dorothy's age is 18, Hilda's 14, and Marjorie is 9 and one brother 15.

My mother and father both have to do work now as things are rather difficult to get. And when we do get anything we have to pay an awful price for it.

At the present moment I am sitting with Hilda and Marjorie round a lovely fire. I do play the piano who is out now as it is raining and there is an awful wind.

In 1942 we had had luck throughout the year. First I had measles then every one else in the family had them too. Then I had an abscess in both ears. Next I had tonsillitis not very bad. Next I had mumps which went all the way round the family and now I have got over another attack of tonsillitis while Hilda is just recovering from hers.

Do have this year we will have a little bit better luck than the last one. I hope so anyway. Well I must close now as it is my bedtime. Goodnight. I hope to hear from you soon.

No Major Disaster in Tunisia

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 (AP)—

Fairly heavy losses in both personnel and equipment are being inflicted on United States forces by the German thrust in Tunisia, war secretary Henry Stimson acknowledged today, but he said there has been no major disaster.

The American defeat amounts, he told a press conference, to a "serious local setback" but one which should neither be exaggerated nor minimized.

The development was not altogether unexpected, he said, and constitutes "one of those reverses which must be expected from time to time in an operation of the size of the Tunisian campaign."

In a general discussion of the war, Stimson also said: "It appears that the Germans, having lost Kharov, must abandon all hope of holding their last winter's line in Russia and fall back all the way to the Dnieper River."

Despite the heavy losses in men and supplies, it is much too soon to expect German collapse; the Nazis still have a powerful army and air force.

The United States has no confirmation of reported changes in the German high command, including replacement of Hitler as the active head of the army.

Peace feelers, already rumored from Germany and Italy but they already have their answer—the Casablanca demands for "unconditional surrender."
