Ltd., took care of last year, has for the first time this year broken into the winning column, accounting for the 2.16 trot at Reading, Pa. in straight heats, time 2.07%, 2.08, 2.08%.

John E. Kelly will be remembered here as having raced Lillian and others with "Red" Hanafin. He is breaking into the Hall of Fame this year with big headlines as a result of the performances of a two year old pacing filly, Maralie Hanover (2) 2.09%, which is a world's record for a pacing filly over a half mile track. Maralie trained a mile on September 15th over the Skowhegan, Maine, track, timed by several watches in 2.05%, last half 1.01%, final quarter 29 1/2 seconds.

Starting out on the trot in 1927 he very soon made good, trotting in a sensational manner for Jack Kingsley and Monte Gerow and winning a lot of races. 1930 was probably one of his best years, racing under the pilotage of Johnny Conroy. He took a record of 2.11% at Charlottetown and afterwards equalled it at Halifax. The next year he was lame and did not do very much. The following year he was purchased from Dr. Calkin by Col. D. A. MacKinnon and turned over to the pace. He was second to Mac Volo in 2.13% and showed ability to pace around 2.14.

## GIANTS WATCH THE SENATORS WALLOP YANKS

Capacity Crowds Expected For Series Games At Polo Grounds.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—The razzle dazzle of the world series worked around to the box office department today as the faithful rested from their efforts to keep a minute-to-minute check on the Senators and the Giants and concentrated on getting tickets for the conflict opening in the Polo Grounds Tuesday.

It will be tomorrow night at the earliest before Eddie Brannick, one of the Giant office executives, will be able to say with any assurance just how many customers figure to be in attendance at the opening and subsequent games. But already the experts are agreeing that if the entire 49,000 seats in the Giants ball park are not sold out, the figures will be closer to full house proportions than for any major sports attraction here in over a year.

## MONTREAL NET STARS DEFEAT NOVA SCOTIANS

Marcel Rainville's Victory Over Bevil Piers Featured Second Day Meet.

HALIFAX, Sept. 29.—Montreal court stars swept easily today through the second day's play of a three-day tennis tournament against Nova Scotia players. Playing on rainswept courts, the Montreal ace, headed by Marcel Rainville, Canada's first ranking player, took the four singles matches in straight sets.

Four Straight

Rainville's victory over Bevil Piers of Halifax, New Brunswick champion, was one of the highlights of the day's play. The French-Canadian took the first set in straight games displaying amazing accuracy in placement. Piers came back in the second set, however, to take three games.

Laird Watt of Montreal defeated Doug Grant of Halifax, 6-2, 6-4. Another Montrealer, Roland Longtin, gained a 6-0, 6-1, win over Harry Roper of Halifax.

In the final match, Robert Murray, Canadian intercollegiate doubles titlist, defeated Peter Aitken of Liverpool, N. S., 6-3, 6-3.

Tomorrow, the final day of the tournament, the Quebec team will play two doubles matches against the Nova Scotians.

## EXPECT FRISCH TO BE ANOTHER JOHN MCGRAW

Erstwhile "Fordham Flash" Gets Monicker "Muggy Jr."

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 29.—(C.P.)—Popularly known throughout the major leagues as the Fordham flash when he cavorted about second base for the New York Giants and St. Louis Cardinals of the National League, Frankie Frisch, who but a few short weeks ago was named pilot of the Cardinals, seems certain to have a new popular monicker labelled upon him.

A baseball writer recently referred to him as Frankie (John McGraw Jr.) Frisch and he certainly started something.

Now he's "McGraw Jr." or "Muggy Jr." to his players, and even Sam Breadon, the trading club president has caught the spirit. Breadon refers to Frankie as "Junior."

"I believe Frisch is going to make a great manager," says Breadon. "It's a large order to say anyone is going to take McGraw's place. But if there is anyone in sight who is going to do it, it is Frisch. Frank has the same over-burning desire to win, that great essential, and he is just as intolerant of mediocrity."

"I believe Frisch teams will play as McGraw teams played—a wide-awake brand of baseball, with everybody hustling and fighting all the way. He has the respect of the team and he's going to be a winner or I'm mistaken."

Breadon is already predicting the Cardinals will win the pennant next season under "Junior's" guidance.

## GIANTS WATCH SENATORS

While the Senators spent the afternoon walloping the Yankees and the Giants improved the hours watching them do it, the office forces concentrated on filling mail order applications for seats so that the more distant patrons can arrive here with tickets already in hand. There is room at the Polo Grounds for 4,000 in box seats, 20,000 in the reserved portions of the grand stands, 20,000 more in unreserved sections there, and 5,000 in the centre field bleachers.

The largest crowd in world series history at the Polo Grounds was the 49,243 that jammed the park for the fourth game of the 1924 series with the Senators. The downward swerve in conditions, the strain of the present system of selling reserved seats only in blocks of three for the first, second and sixth games here, seem to preclude a sellout.

With his pitchers clustered close around him, Billy Terry and the rest of the Giants sought to pick up a few last minute pointers on the strength and weakness of the Senators, and saw considerable of both. The Yanks combed Earl Whitehill while the Senators in turn put on another hitting show.

## BRAVES CUT CARDS LEAD

## MACK SAYS ROOKIE IS HERE TO STAY

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 29.—Johnnie Marcum, the lanky kid from Eminence, Ky., has the baseball experts agog. Just a few weeks ago the gawky youngster was yanked from Louisville of the American Association, sat a few days on the bench and then was ordered to step out and start a game on the mound for the Philadelphia Athletics. He scored a shutout. Then to the complete astonishment of the wise ones he duplicated the performance a few days later.

Asked to name some hurler whose startling record in the major leagues could compare with Marcum's 18 innings of shutout ball, the team's veteran pilot, Connie Mack, pondered a moment.

"To be perfectly frank, I don't recall any pitcher starting like that," he said. "I don't believe any one ever hung two shutouts in a row as a starter. He sure looks good, doesn't he?"

"But don't think he won't be hit. He has some bumps coming but you can say this for me about Marcum—he's here to stay."

## Sport Briefs

Nearly 100,000 people were in attendance at the world's University games, Mussolini Stadium, Turin, when Luigi Boccali, Olympic champion 1500 metre runner and a native Italian, defeated Jack Lovelock, holder of the world's record for one mile running, 4.07 3-4 in the 1500 metre final. It was a memorable race. Boccali took the lead on the second lap and set a tremendous pace, Lovelock hanging on at his heels. He made an effort to sprint by the Italian at the finish but could not connect, finishing a short distance back. The time 3 minutes, 49 2-10 seconds equals the wonderful world's record made by the Frenchman, Jules Ladoumeque, whose world's record for one mile Jack Lovelock lowered this summer.

The Mussolini Stadium and sports grounds is the finest in the world. It is capable of seating upwards of 100,000 people, has two outdoor swimming pools in connection, indoor swimming baths, tennis and basket ball courts, all surrounded by beautiful gardens. The dressing rooms are a real luxury and are connected with all parts of the arena by phone and loud speaker. There are special rooms for massage and medical attention. The track is one of the best laid out and fastest in the entire world.

As a result of the encouragement given sport by the Mussolini Government thousands of young men and young women are taking it up seriously and everyone who has any knowledge of games is looked on with admiration and invited to share their knowledge with others that have less.

Foot racing is once again getting very popular and it is expected that several of the world's greatest professional runners including Nurmi and Ladoumeque will arrive in New York early in November to take part in a series of indoor running races. 10,000 people watched Ladoumeque defeat the Finnish runner, Purje, in a kilometre run at the Buffalo Stadium, Paris, in two minutes 29 2-5 seconds.

All the hockey players who come in under students or industrial transfer clause, must be in residence in their respective cities on or before October 1st. We understand Alderman John Conn is up to Montreal, Ottawa and other cities with Red Stewart, rounding up the new material so as to have it in Halifax prior to the above date.

At the meeting of the Maritime Hockey League at Amherst, October 9th, Charlottetown, Moncton and Halifax will be represented and no doubt the schedule and other arrangements for the season will be prepared. It is understood that Saint John and Fredericton are not in a position to enter into the League and will not be present. They will probably form a league with Sussex as last year.

While a great many people think the Big Three should be the Big Four or Five, they fail to take in-

to account the tremendous cost of travelling, etc., that enters into such an arrangement. Unless the added team is of high calibre and equal to giving the others a real battle every time, their presence is a big hindrance financially, and furthermore, one game a week which the Big Three arrangement gives in each city is likely to prove better financially than more games would be, particularly if some of the games were of a medium quality.

Professional hockey players of the National Hockey League have started training at various centres. This would be physical preparation for ice work which will probably start about October 18th.

The New York Herald of Wednesday says: "Reg Shields of Ottawa, today signed a contract to play the coming season with the Black Hawks of the National Hockey League. Shields will leave for Chicago next week. He played for the last two seasons with the Wolverines of Halifax and was high scorer in the Maritime Hockey League."

The above statement is not quite correct. Shields was not high scorer in the Maritime Hockey League the season of 1932-33, but was high scorer in the Nova Scotia League the season of 1931-32 and we believe was high scorer for the Maritimes that year. The Black Hawks is one of the leading professional teams in the United States and we hope Reg makes good with them.

Gordon Richards is today England's leading jockey. He has already won 200 races and expects to beat the British record made by Fred Archer in 1835 when he rode 246 winners in a season.

Jack Sharkey is going back with a vengeance, Carnera, K. O'd him, then Leminsky walloped him and now Tommy Loughran has out-pointed him. It has been our observation over a number of years that a real good K. O. generally puts the quietus on a fighter that is anyways advanced in years and Sharkey is thirty-two. We believe that it leads to a certain amount of atrophy of the brain and the think-piece does not function as quickly and one must think very quick in the ring or get biffed.

Mickey Walker, the toy bulldog, is not all through yet. He has been matched with Maxie Rosenbloom, light heavyweight champion for a fifteen round bout at Madison Square Garden on November 3rd.

When the hockey season starts this year at Charlottetown, Charlottetonians will have the unique pleasure of watching their hockeyists battle with the Canadian champions, the Moncton Hawks, holders of the Allan Cup. In fact we could go further and call them world's champions because the former holders of the Allan Cup, the Winnipeg team, had won that title

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## NEAR RIOT AS CHOCOLATE IS AWARDED BOUT

Crowd Takes Exception to Referee's Decision in Awarding Featherweight Champ.

PARIS, Sept. 29.—(A.P.)—Kid Chocolate, featherweight boxing champion, scored a technical knockout over Nick Bensa in the final round of a 10-round match tonight that almost precipitated a riot.

Referee Rene Schemann stopped the fight after Bensa had been floored for a nine count and the judges concurred in Schemann's decision. The crowd thought differently, however, and in the midst of the roar of protest miscellaneous missiles deluged the ring.

Someone heaved a chair into the ring. The timekeeper was hit but not badly hurt. Police reinforcements were required to quiet the crowd.

Bensa was writing badly under Chocolate's punches when the referee intervened. Each weighed 125 pounds.

## SECOND GAME IS POSTPONED

C. C. Gillespie Says He Has Not Changed Decision Calling For Three-game Round.

SPRINGHILL, N. S., Sept. 29.—Rain-soaked playing paths called a temporary halt today to the final series for the Nova Scotia baseball title. Overnight rains left the field in almost unplayable condition, and a final deluge this afternoon drove Springhill fencebusters from the grounds.

Today's encounter was to have been the second game of the series. Yesterday, Springhill took a 2-1 victory on the home field. The second game will be played here tomorrow if the weather permits.

To both teams, the series is still regarded as a three-out-of-five affair, although President C. C. Gillespie of the M. P. B. A. U. of C. insists he has not changed his original decision calling for a three-game round. The teams are expected to move to Halifax early next week for the next two matches.
