CANADA TO EXHIBIT BARLEY TO BREWERS

OTTAWA, Sept. 24.—It is expected Canada will exhibit barley at the national brewers' exhibition, which opens in London, England, on Nov. 3. A request for space has been sent forward and arrangements are being completed for the staging of an exhibit. It will enable brewers to see samples of barley grain from stock in special storage, which could be shipped at a moment's notice to fill orders.

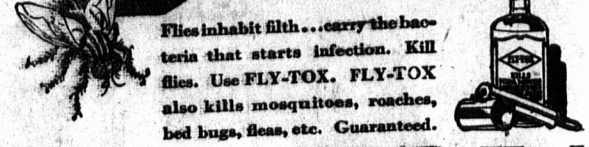
The brewing of lighter beer of much lower alcoholic content has created a demand for a sun-cured barley for blending with the home-grown barley. As the British beers are now much like the Canadian there are good prospects of securing a market for Canadian barley, which it is claimed, is equal in its malting properties to that exported from California.

The dominion cerealist describes the venture as "a cold-blooded selling proposition," with the showing of actual samples of the actual barley available for immediate shipment.

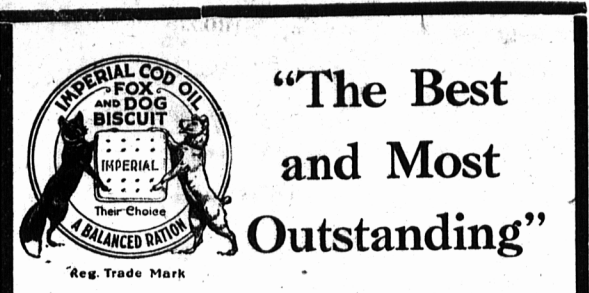
