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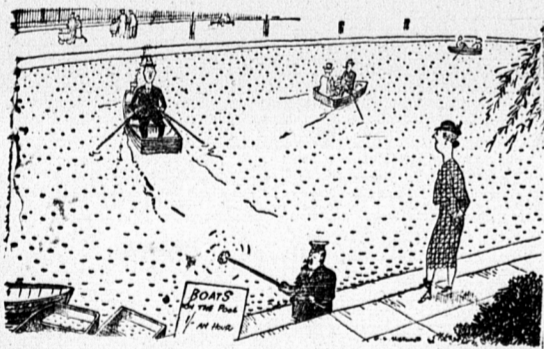

The Central Guardian Flying Attracts England's Women But Jobs Scarce

WORLD-FAMED PILOTS BUSY WRITING AS CIVIL AIR GUARD GROWS AND EXPERTS TELL OF GOOD MONEY IN COOKING.

LONDON, Sept. 15 (P) - According to Air Commodore J. A. Chamler's estimate about 3,000 women will have their applications accepted early in September for entrance into the Civil Air Guard.

Trained at their personal cost of about 50 cents a lesson, about 25 per cent are expected to qualify as pilots. Of the rest, the air commodore explained, some might be called upon for war-time work on the ground and "at least they will know how to spell the various parts of a plane if they get jobs as secretaries."

When the women decided they did not want to be separated from the men in training classes or from part of any women's organization such as the Women's Legion of the Army, the women chosen to lead them, Mrs. F. G. Miles, was relegated to the slightly less high-sounding post of one of the commissaries on the Civil Air Guard whose duties will consist mostly in acting as a buffer between the air ministry and the air clubs who are undertaking the training.

"England's hospitals and institutions offer a wide field of opportunity and well-trained cook or dietician. They will pay almost anything to the right women," is her remark. For those who must have the different job she told of Speech Therapy, not only curing stutters but beautifying thick, ugly speech and acting in advisory capacity to radio speakers.

Migration South - Eleanor Nicholson of the Women's Overseas Settlement Board has waved goodbye to more than 500 women who have gone to South Africa, Australia and New Zealand to take jobs since the start of the year. She is a teacher and nurses have the best chance. Correct qualifications are necessary. Pay is about the same as here, conditions are better. Eleanor Nicholson had also something to say on the subject of husband hunters.

She is talking owing to the shortage of men in England and some of the younger women get the idea they can use business as a trap for matrimony by getting jobs in more desirable places. "There may be men but they are just as wary," is Eleanor's advice. "If you are after your man take time off to get him down to earth. His real interests or 'you'll lose your job.'" She has watched developments since British women started to migrate through her society in 1925.

Any Johnson Writing - The two most outstanding women pilots in England are both on the lookout for jobs. Any Johnson Mollison has taken up writing as a stopgap and is reporting the progress of the Civil Air Guard for a Sunday paper. She does a lot of the writing herself, finds it difficult but likes the job.
