**WEDDING BELLS.**—St. Paul's Church Charlottetown, was the scene of a very quiet wedding yesterday at 3.15 p. m. when Miss Rita Isabel Christie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin J. Christie of North Sydney, C. B., became the wife of Captain John Stanley Bagnell, of No. 5 Siege Battery, C. E. F., Charlottetown. The ceremony was unattended, the ceremony being performed by the rector of St. Paul's, Rev. T. W. Murphy, in the presence of the groom's family. After the ceremony the happy young couple left on the 3.45 p. m. train. The Guardian is extending hearty felicitations to the happy young couple.

**SUDDEN DEATH AT MONTAGUE.**—Mr. James McDonald, assistant porter on the Car Ferry steamer received the sad news upon the arrival of that steamer in Charlottetown yesterday that his father, Mr. Norman J. Macdonald, of Montague, had passed away. Deceased was in the 70th year and his death which took place the previous evening, came very suddenly. He was one of the prominent business men of Montague and had done much to promote the welfare of the town. For many years he conducted the well-known Montague Mills and through his instrumentality an electrical lighting plant was introduced. He was married to a sister of the late Judge McLeod and besides his widow there are left to mourn two sons, James, already referred to and Maynard proprietor of the McDonald Hotel and one daughter, Miss Ola at home. The funeral will take place on Saturday.

**PATRIOTIC SOCIETY.**—A meeting of the Patriotic Society was held in the Recruiting Room yesterday afternoon. Rev. Dr. Fullerton presided and the others present were: Judge Stewart, Col. Peake, Rev. Dr. Bennett, Major Leigh, Mr. J. M. Hughes, and Mr. J. R. Burnett. The chairman reported that a successful Sunday afternoon meeting under the auspices of the Society had been held in the Prince Edward Theatre which was addressed by Major Pringle, army chaplain, at the front. The chairman also reported that serious delay had occurred in payment of allowances, and certain families had been in distress. He said he had been temporarily relieved by Col. Campbell. It was agreed to reimburse him. Complaint was made that women entitled to assistance from the Patriotic Fund were not getting the consideration they deserved. The general opinion was expressed that the Patriotic Fund ought to have an office to which anyone interested could refer for information and advice, and a committee consisting of the Rev. Dr. Fullerton, Rev. Dr. Bennett, and Mr. J. M. Hughes was appointed to bring the matter before the Relief Committee. It was arranged to hold Patriotic Meetings at the Revere Hotel on Monday next, the speakers to be Rev. Dr. Bennett, Captain Bagnell, and Major Leigh at the former, and Rev. Dr. Fullerton and Col. Peake at the latter.

**BURIED AT BEDEQUE.**—The funeral of Mrs. (Rev.) F. A. Wightman was held in Bedeque Methodist Church on Sunday morning, May 7th. Notwithstanding the short notice, the church was crowded with friends of the deceased, who came to pay their last tribute to one whom everybody loved and respected. The services were conducted by Rev. George Ayers, pastor of the church, who based his remarks upon Rev. 2, 10, "The Faithful Unto Death and I will give Thee a Crown of Life." During his discourse he brought out the thought of what death cannot rob the Christian of, viz., Fellowship with Christ, the privilege of praising God, opportunities for service, for His word declares "They are here before the throne, and serve Him day and night." No can death take from the Christian, the influence he has exerted upon others. He spoke in glowing terms of the faithfulness of the deceased, and of her influence for good over all with whom she came in contact, and urged his hearers to follow her example. He said that during his pastorate, he had where the deceased had spent the greater part of her life he had never heard her spoken of but in the kindest of terms. The hymns "Asleep in Jesus blessed sleep," and "Servant of God," were most appropriate, and evoked the sentiments of the entire congregation. Mrs. W. W. Jenkins sang "Some day the silver cord will break," and a selection was given by Mrs. (Rev.) Ayers, Mrs. Jenkins, Miss Louise Wright, Mr. Thos. Moyses and Mr. Colin Wright. After the benediction was pronounced the casket was opened and the friends were given an opportunity to view the remains, and as the congregation passed up one aisle and down the other, the choir sang softly and with much feeling "Silently, Silently, we bury our dead." The writer was impressed with the evidence of universal sorrow, young and old alike, were moved to tears as they looked for the last time upon the face of one who had endeared herself to all. Among the very numerous floral offerings were a beautiful pillow from the Bathurst, N. B., congregation of the Methodist Church, and wreaths from the Bedeque, W. M. S. Circle and Band of which Mrs. Wightman had been a life member. The pall bearers were: Thos. Wright, Albert Crosby, Jesse Schurman, J. W. Wright, P. W. Davison and Albert Wright. Besides the sorrowing husband and his children, to whom she was a most devoted mother, there are left to mourn two sisters and one brother, Mrs. M. E. Campbell, Bedeque; Miss Louise Crosby, Westford, Mass and G. Hedley Crosby, Ellersford, Manitoba.
