STINT OF BABY NAMING Selecting Monicker For New-Born Can Be Most Important

Now that the country's biggest bumper crop of babies is about to be christened, I am moved to make a heart-felt plea to parents to give some serious consideration to the monicker they are about to wish on their helpless offspring.

Probably no other one thing has started more domestic rows and caused more bitterness and hard feelings than naming a Junior. For Mama thinks that her baby is being named after her, and she has a right to call him after her family, but if she does, her in-laws never feel the same towards her; whereas if Papa is named after her, she has a right to bestow upon the youngster who has no regard for a mother's feelings.

Now naming the baby is no inconsequential matter for, Mr. Shakespeare to the contrary, nevertheless, it is something that profoundly affects the bearer of it through life and can grate on the nerves of an individual every day of his life.

So for these reasons parents should be guided not by Grandma's and Grandpa's vanity in desiring namesakes or by their admiration for some current hero, in picking out their children's names, but by what the children would want to be called themselves for the next 80 or 90 years.
