The Earl Grey crossed to Georgetown from Pictou yesterday, meeting considerable ice on the way over. She docked at Georgetown at three fifteen p.m. She brought over two hundred barrels of flour, one car of seed, four cars mixed freight. The Minto crossed to Pictou from Georgetown and docked at three twenty-five. The special mail train arrived in this city at eight fifty-five. The special outward left at ten o'clock. The outward cargo by the Earl Grey this morning will be two cars of way freight.

At the Police Court in this City yesterday the case against Frank Mahar charged with breaking and entering Cameron's Hardware store on the night of the eighth instant came up for final hearing. Being alone at the time, he climbed steps, a hundred feet to the surface, unaided, dragging the injured member.

The death occurred at the Charlottetown Hospital Wednesday night, of Jeanne Paquet, daughter of Daniel Paquet of the Magdalen Islands. She came to the Province last fall to undergo an operation, and at the closing of navigation was not in a condition to be removed to her home. Her father, who accompanied her returned home by the last trip of the steamer Lady Sybil. As the cable to the Magdalen Islands is broken, there is no possible means of informing her parents of her death. Her body was taken to Souris Thursday, where it will be interred till spring.

The death occurred at Charlottetown suddenly on the 14th of Feb., of Hannah, the beloved wife of the late Peter Steadman, aged 92. She fell asleep at her daughter's residence 23 Orlebar St. The funeral service was held on the 15th, by the Rev. G. R. White, at 1.30 o'clock, thence by train to Bradalbane thence by road to Crapaud where service was held in the Episcopal Church. Her remains were laid at rest in the quiet little cemetery at Crapaud in the presence of a large number of neighbours and friends. "And I heard a voice saying, blessed are the dead that die in the Lord."
