Sir George Foster Praised by Ontario Fruit Growers

His Enterprises in Advertising Canadian Apples Resulted in Greatly Increased Home Consumption

The Ontario Fruit Growers' Association at their 55th annual convention held at Toronto, November 11th, 12th and 13th, paid a high tribute to the efforts of Sir George Foster in instituting a nationwide advertising campaign to bring before the people of Canada the merits of the Canadian apple. The enterprise of Sir George was unanimously commended at the opening of the organization's convention Wednesday and Thursday. As a further mark of appreciation to the Minister of Trade and Commerce the following resolution was passed with great enthusiasm.
