VASHTI, VEILED

Dr. Talmage Commends Modesty in Women.

Draws a Lesson From the Story of Drunken Ahasuerus—Condemns the Bold Female Demagogue Some Heroic Women.

WASHINGTON, July 3.—Dr. Talmage in this discussion tells the story of the beautiful queen de-throned and draws practical lessons for all conditions and all times; text, Esther 1, 11-12. "Bring Vashti, the queen before the king with the crown royal to show the princes and the people her beauty, for she was fair to look upon; but the Queen Vashti refused to come."

We stand amid the palaces of Shushan. The pinpoints are aflame with the morning light. The columns rise festooned and wreathed, the wreath of empires flashing from the grooves, the ceiling adorned with images of bird and beast and scenes of prowess and conquest. The walls are hung with shields and emblazoned until it seems that the whole round of splendors is circumscribed. Each arch is a mighty leaf of architectural achievement. Golden stars shining down on glowing arabesque. Hangings of an embroidered work in which mingle the blueness of the sky, the greenness of the grass and the whiteness of the sea foam. Tapestries hung on silver rings, welding together the pillars of marble Pavilions reaching out in every direction. These for repose, filled with luxuriant couches, in which weary limbs sink until all fatigue is submerged. These for carousal, where kings drink down a kingdom at one swallow. "Amazing spectacle! Light of silver dripping down over stars of ivory on shields of gold. Floors of stained marble, sunset red and night black and inlaid with gleaming pearl. In connection with this palace there is a garden where the mighty men of foreign lands are seated at a banquet. Under the spread of oak and linden and acacia the tables are arranged. The breath of honey-suckle and frankincense fills the air. Fountains leap up into the light, the spray struck through with rainbows falling into crystalline baptism upon flowering shrubs, then rolling down through channels of marble and widening out here and there into pools swarming with the finny tribes of foreign aquariaums bordered with scarlet anemones hypericums and many colored ranunculi.

A WOMAN WRONGED. In another part of the place Queen Vashti is entertaining the Princess of Persia at a banquet. Drunken Ahasuerus says to his servants, "You go and fetch Vashti from that banquet with the women and bring her to this banquet with the men, and let her display her beauty." The servants immediately suit to obey the king's command, but there was a rule in oriental society that no woman might appear in public without having her face veiled. Yet here was a mandate that Vashti come in unveiled before the multitude. However there was in Vashti's soul a principle more regal than Ahasuerus, more brilliant than the gold of Shushan, of more wealth than the realm of Persia, which commanded her to disobey the order of the king, and so all the righteousness and boldness and modesty of her nature rise up into one sublime refusal. She says, "I will not go into the banquet unveiled." Ahasuerus was infuriated, and Vashti, robbed of her position and her estate, is driven forth in poverty and ruin to suffer the scorn of a nation, and yet to receive the applause of after generations, who shall rise up to admire this martyr of kingly insolence. Well, the last vestige of that feast is gone, the last garland has faded, the last arch has fallen, the last tinkard has been destroyed, and Shushan is a ruin, but as long as the world stands there will be multitudes of men and women familiar with the Bible who will come into this picture gallery of God and admire the divine portrait of Vashti the queen, the veiled, vashti the sacrifice, Vashti the silent.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND And Its Attractions to Tourists.

Prince Edward Island's summer climate is delightful, free alike from chilling fogs and excessive heat. The many bays and winding esuaries, together with the dark and bright green foliage, and the rich verdure of the meadows, make up a scenery which is beautiful and quietly picturesque. Surrounded by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, whose waters are almost as saline as those of the ocean itself, it enjoys all the coolness of the sea breeze, and the advantages that can only be derived from sea bathing. The average temperature of the water is about 65 degrees.

Charlottetown, the important city of the Island, has over 12,000 inhabitants, and is the capital. It is connected by rail, steamship and stage with all the important villages, towns and seaports, and an extra fine farming region. It has many great retail stores, besides a large wholesale trade. It has two Electric light plants and a street railway will soon be an accomplished fact. It has a first class water works system supplying the city with as good if not the best water in America, and a complete modern system of sewerage is now being constructed. It is famed for its wide streets, many of which are shaded, its many pleasant drives, the principal of which is the new Park Roadway, its attractive surroundings, pure water, and clear, cool and bracing air. It is widely known as one of the healthiest cities in Canada. It has two hospitals, many churches and a large and elegant new Opera House. It also has several fine public buildings and a market which is one of the chief sources of the citizens' pride. It has one of the largest and best equipped pork-packing establishments in the Dominion. On its west side is Victoria Park—a favorite summer resort—while on the east are the magnificent new Exhibition Buildings and Driving Park. Chief among its public squares is Queen Square in the centre of the city, beautifully laid out with blooming plants of every description, fountains and well arranged walks, and enlivened with a band of music during the summer evenings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of Charlottetown is charming, and horses for driving are abundant at very low prices. Bosts can also be hired, and steamers run regularly on the bays and river, affording most pleasant excursions. The principal hotels are Davies, \$2.00 up per day, \$10.50 up per week; Queen, \$1.50 per day, \$6.00 up per week; Revere \$1.00 to \$1.50 per day, \$4.00—\$5.00 per week.

Summerside is the next largest town in the Province, with about 4000 inhabitants. It is situated on beautiful Bedouque Bay and in the centre of a fine large farming region. It has the largest and finest departmental store in the Maritime Provinces, besides having other large retail stores. It has an Electric Light Plant, and a water works system and sewerage are being agitated for. Tourists are delighted with the beautiful scenery and the many pleasant drives in the immediate vicinity of Summerside. The hotels are—Clifton, \$2.00 per day, by agreement per week; Russ, \$1.50 per day, \$7.00 per week; Campbell, \$1.25 per day, \$6.00 per week.

Georgetown and Souris are the two important towns in the eastern part of the Island, with a population of about 1,000 each. In the former the Aitken, Tupper, \$1.50 per day, \$5.00—\$6.00 per week, furnish good hotel accommodation, while in Souris the Sea View, \$1.50 per day, \$8.00 per week, affords exceedingly home-like quarters. At Cape Traverse, a very pleasant summer resort, is the Lansdowne, a large, airy hotel at \$1.00 up per day, \$4.00 to \$8.00 per week. In Alberton, there is the Albion Terrace, \$1.50 per day, 5.00 per week. In Tignish, Railway, 1.00 per day, 5.00 per week. In Kensington, Clark's 1.25 per day, 6.00 per week; Commercial 1.00 per day, 5.00 per week. In Montserrat, McDonald 1.00—1.50 per day, 6.00 per week. In Mount Stewart, Clark's and Manson, each 1.00 per day or 4.00 per week.

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View, \$1.00 per day, \$5.00 per week. At Stanhope, Munch's \$1.30 per day, \$5—7 pr. week. Cliff \$1.00 per day, 5—6 pr. week. At Brackley Beach, Shaw's, \$1.30 per day, 6—8 pr. week; Sea View, \$1.00 per day, 5—6 pr. week. At Rustico, Seaside, \$1.75 per day, 7—10 pr. week. At Malpeque, North Shore, \$1.00 per day, \$6. up pr. week. At Tracadie Beach, Acadia \$2.50 pr. day, \$8.00 pr. week. At Alberton, Seaforth, \$1.50 pr. day, \$7.00 pr. week. At Pownall, Florida, \$1.52 pr. day, 5—7 pr. week. In addition to those already mentioned there are several other important and progressive towns and villages in the Province, all with ample hotel accommodation, while the numerous comfortable farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists at moderate rates.

The rivers and streams team with trout, the bays with mackerel, while game of almost every description abounds.
