LIBRARY TO MEET TOWN COUNCIL—The new library committee at Summerside in connection with the proposed branch of the Carnegie library at Summerside met this week. It was decided that the presiding Regent of the local chapter of the I. O. D. E. would from now on act as chairman of the committee, in addition there would be five members of the Order on the committee; also the resident clergy of the different denominations of the town: the Mayor; one representative of the Catholic Women's League and five other citizens of the town that the committee may name. The committee intends as soon as Miss Bateson returns to the Island to lay the facts concerning the offer of the Carnegie Corporation to place a free library in Summerside before the Town Council with a view of Town ownership. The cost is small compared to the benefits that will be received by the citizens of the town to have a library of over one thousand books entirely free. The only cost would be the salary of the librarian in charge and the initial cost of making the ad-

justment. The I. O. D. E. have done splendid work in the past and it is hoped that sufficient interest will be taken to back up the work so well begun by them.—S

Mr. O'Brien, who has been appointed to a church in St. Catharines, Quebec, delivered a most interesting address taking for his subject "Religious education in our Church schools."
