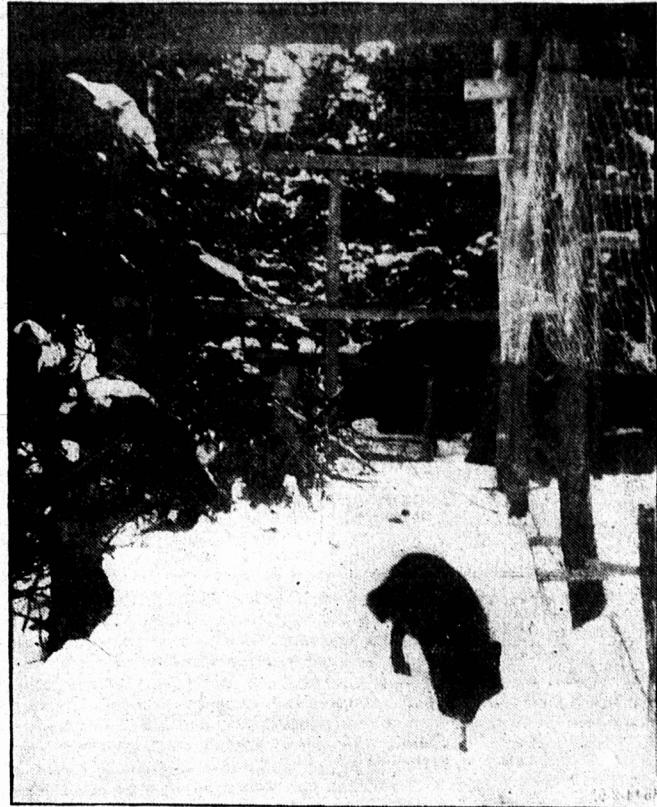

CONCESSION TO LAKE FISHER-
MEN.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—In response to
representations from the Quebec Gun-
nerment an Order-in-Council has been
passed here rescinding the prohibition
against all net fishing in the Lake of
Two Mountains, Lake St. Francis and
Lake St. Louis.

fishermen in those districts are in
such need that it is important that
they should be allowed to engage in
such fishing to some extent.

HEIR OF TOBACCO
MAKER CAN'T SMOKE.

GANANOQUE, Feb. 8.—The late
Chas. J. Emery, who died recently in
New York, has left by his will, \$100,
000 for the upkeep of his palatial sum-
mer residence "Calumet Island" op-
posite this town. Mr. Emery was
known here as the millionaire cigar-
ette manufacturer. It is said that, al-
though the nucleus of his great for-
tune was made in the manufacture of
cigarettes, by the provision of his will
as grandson, his namesake, is depriv-
ed of his share of the estate unless he
abstains from the use of tobacco and
intoxicants until he is 30 years of age.

DACIA AT NORFOLK.

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 8.—The steam-
er Dacia, transferred recently from
German to American registry, and on
her way to Rotterdam, with a cargo of
cotton from Galveston, arrived here
to-day for coal, before proceeding
across the Atlantic. Great Britain is
expected to seize the ship and cargo
before the vessel reaches its destina-
tion.

4TH P.E.I. HEAVEY BATTERY, 8; NORTH SYDNEY, 8.

On Tuesday, Feb. 2nd, the above
teams lined-up for their third game.
There was some delay in starting on
account of the North Sydney team
being composed of a couple of profes-
sional players—that is, men who
played one or more games with the
Millionaires—and were unable to
maintain their places. But after a
certain amount of kick on the P.E.I.
players part, they were removed and
a couple who had only footed about ten
minutes with the Millionaires put on
in their places. The game was fast
and exciting from start to finish. C.
Murley, commonly known in sporting
circles as Buller, notched the first
3 goals for the Battery, and at half-
time the score stood 4-3 in favour of
P.E.I., after Jack Gordon had slam-
med in another. The second half was
rather rough—that is to say, North
Sydney tried to rough it, but they
found to their sorrow that the P.E.I.
cover point, in the person of L.
Davidson, and the right wing, in the
person of McGuigan, were also able
to return with interest all rough play.
After Murley had scored a couple of
more goals, and Gordon with a bril-
liant run added another, the score
stood 7-3 in favour of North Sydney.
Then with a few minutes to play the
score ended 8-8. Gordon, Murley and
Guggie distinguished themselves in
the forward line, and Davidson and
Burke on the defence played a con-
sistent game. Come again, North
Sydney!

KAISER LOST MORE SHIPS THAN STATED.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—A Chronicle cor-
respondent near the German frontier
sends the following despatch:—
"I learn that besides the published
German naval losses there are eight
destroyers and two submarines writ-
ten off in the official lists. Two of the
destroyers were lost in the Channel
on Sept. 4, three on the Dogger Bank,
and another, the S190, in Asiatic
waters. One of the submarines sank
off Westende and one near the Dogger
Bank. Two others have been missing
for over three weeks. The armed
cruiser Kronprinzessin Cecilie is
also scratched off the official
table.
"The statement made by German
bluejackets captured after the Helg-
oland naval battle of Jan. 24, that the
cruiser Kolberg sank is con-
firmed, though not publicly admitted
in German naval circles.
"The report published early in Dec.
that the German battleship Kaiser
Wilhelm der Grosse, and armoured
cruiser Hertha had been lost in the
Baltic is incorrect. The armoured
cruiser Friedrich Karl sank after
striking a German mine in the Baltic
on Nov. 18. It is known that this
vessel has gone to the bottom, but the
manner of its loss has never been
definitely announced."

BELGIUM PROTESTS GERMANY'S ACTION

PARIS, Feb. 6.—The Belgium Gov-
ernment has issued a protest against
the recent action of Germany in an-
nulling the exequaturs of consuls of
neutral powers in Belgium. The Uni-
ted States and Belgium agree, says
the protest, that Germany has no right
to annul the exequaturs. The two
countries, it adds, only recognize the
mission of Germany to suspend the
mission of Consuls when military ex-
igencies make such a step necessary.

PAN, BRIDE EE.

Feb. 8.—J. W. News re-
fers old, for from San
Antonio, Tex., that Hedda
Burgemeister, who was
accused with killing
the wealthy Jewer, Otto Koehler, No-
vember 2, 1914, was en route to
Europe to nurse wounded soldiers.
The trial of Miss Burgemeister was
set for yesterday in the Alamo City,
and the fact that she had fled was not
known until the case was called. Then
a letter was presented to District
Judge W. Sanderson.

The Court forfeited Miss Burgemeis-
ter's bond for \$7,500 in certified
checks on the First National Bank of
San Antonio, the bondsmen being Jas.
R. Noble and Mrs. Emma Paschel.

Miss Burgemeister's letter was
mailed January 28 on a train between
Pittsburg and New York, being on
stationery of the Pennsylvania Rail-
road. It follows:—
"I left San Antonio because I do not
want a trial. I am on the way to Eu-
rope to nurse the wounded and help
the sufferers. I hope and pray that
the day may arrive soon on which He
will end my sufferings and take me
home."

The letter was presented to State
Senator Carlos Bee. Miss Burgemeis-
ter's counsel to whom it was address-
ed, on objection by State's counsel
the letter was not read by the court.

The killing of Mr. Koehler occurred
at the home of Miss Burgemeister,
who had been brought to this country
by Mr. Koehler and his wife as the
latter's maid. The killing was wit-
nessed by Mrs. Paschel, one of the
signers of Miss Burgemeister's bond,
who was arrested at the time but lat-
terly released. The cause of the
shooting was clothed in mystery. Miss
Burgemeister declaring Mr. Koehler
attacked her and that she fired in
self-defence.
