BRITISH ARMY AND NAVY LEAGUE CLUB

A club for British Soldiers and Sailors from all parts of the Empire has been opened at the Hotel Moderne, Place de la Republique, Paris, where suitable premises have been placed at the disposal of the Committee of the British Colony in Paris appointed for the purpose. Among others, the British Ambassador, the Earl of Derby, Sir Douglas Haig, Sir John Jellicoe and General Sir William Robertson, have become patrons of the Club, and the Commandant-in-Chief has shown his warm interest by telegraphing to the Committee as follows:—"Your scheme to further the comfort of British soldiers in Paris in such a practical manner, must meet with universal approval, and I cordially support it, and wish you every success."

The British Army and Navy League Club has been organized to meet the needs of British soldiers on leave in Paris. It is the wish of most British soldiers serving in France, and especially of those from the Dominions, to take advantage of their presence in the country to pay a visit to the French capital, and large numbers are availing themselves of the opportunity afforded by a few days' leave of coming to Paris. It is certain that the British Army and Navy League Club supplies a real want and will be greatly appreciated by the men. It provides them with comfortable quarters at reasonable prices, where they can sleep and eat and amuse themselves with the same freedom as in an hotel, and where, also, they are able to obtain all the information necessary for making the best of their short leisure. It

protects them from extortion, helps them over the language difficulty by providing competent guides, and tells them what is worth seeing and how to see it, and what it is better to avoid. The object is one undoubtedly special and great interest to the British public, and the Committee make an urgent and immediate appeal to it to co-operate generously, by providing ample funds with which the British Army and Navy League Club may be made a success. Our rooms are becoming too small for the numbers of men who use the Club and we propose to secure considerable larger accommodation, which will involve a great increase in cost. The men's appreciation is shown by the following extract from a letter written to the Hon. Secretary by two of our soldiers:—"It is with great pleasure we record our deep appreciation of your efforts on our behalf and thanks to the ladies for their self-sacrificing services. May we be allowed to say that we think just the right note has been struck! The Club is a home in the best sense of the word."
