Wings Drub Amerks 7-3 In Detroit

DETROIT, Feb. 5—(CP)—Rookie Guy Giesebrecht turned the hat-trick in the first period for Detroit tonight to lead the Red Wings to a 7-3 victory over the Toronto Maple Leafs.

It was the second successive National Hockey League game in which Amerks had seven goals against them.

Approximately 6,000 persons saw the Wings play their best hockey of the season as they defeated the Leafs in the first 90 minutes, during which five goals were scored.

After taking a commanding lead, Detroit was content to play defensive hockey and attempt to catch the Americans with four or five men up the ice. The strategy produced two more tallies in the final session, which was extended to almost 25 minutes when the second period had to be cut short because of a temporary failure of the lighting system in Olympia Stadium.

TORONTO, Feb. 5—(CP)—As crowd pleasers, New York Rangers should rate four stars in the hockey world on the basis of their showing here Saturday night.

While 13,518 fans goggled and gasped at their speed and passing, Lester Patrick's blueshirts handed Toronto Maple Leafs a 4-2 defeat—the Smythenes' second straight on home ice.

The victory advanced Rangers to within five points of the league leading Boston Bruins while the loss prevented Toronto from consolidating their fourth place position against the combined Detroit-Chicago threat.

Power and more power was the motto of the Rangers as they wiped out a one-goal first period lead set up by the Leafs with a three-goal spurge in the second.

The teams split a brace of goals in the third marked by a full 20 minutes of sustained action with Leafs attempting to match the forechecking of their rivals.

Those were the Toronto marksmen with Neil Colville, Clint Smith, Phil Watson and Bryan Hextall bagging the Ranger tallies.

Considering the helter-skelter pace which the teams hit, the game was remarkably clean. Bingo Kampman, Toronto and Art Coulter, New York, rival defencemen, drawing the only penalties.

Leafs Hold Rangers To Tie Game In Rugged Tilt; Bruins Blank Hawks 3-0

NEW YORK, Feb. 5—(CP)—The Toronto Maple Leafs overcame a two goal lead in the third period to tie the New York Rangers in a National Hockey League game in which "everything happened." A crowd of 13,675 in Madison Square Garden watched the encounter, the second between the teams in as many nights. The Rangers won 4-2 in Toronto Saturday night.

Added to 70 minutes of fast, rugged hockey, there were an "automatic goal," 30 minutes of penalties a fist fight, a disallowed tally, a penalty shot, and Clint Smith's first goal in the 83 games he has played in his league hockey.

Bryan Hextall scored two goals to put the Rangers ahead in the first period. Then a pair by Red Horner and one from Gus Markers' stick put the Leafs in front. Phil Watson broke away again and scored.

The game apparently won, the Rangers elaxed off, only to be surprised by two quick tallies by Doc Romnes and Syl Appes, which sent the teams into overtime.
