The order of the day was reached at 10 o'clock and amid warm applause Professor Shaw took up the theme "The church and the war." Two years ago a committee was appointed to consider the moral and spiritual issues involved in the war and Professor Shaw has been the convener on that committee.

For the first year the absorbing aspect of study by the committee was conditions in connection with the returned soldiers. These men generally speaking will be touched with a new sense of the realities of life. They will therefore be in a position to hear with sympathy the appeals that will come to them through a consecrated church, the demand for service and sacrifice in advancing God's Kingdom. The speaker outlined the new demand of the hour.

1. A quickened consciousness in the church as to the essential obligations of church membership. 2. A new constraint of the cross and a more heroic witness to its power. 3. A new and more radiant and infectious spirit of comradeship and fellowship.

A new aspect of the question has recently emerged, the thought of preparation for victory—the creation of moral and spiritual forces that will make us worthy of the high task of God.

In this matter our neighbors in the United States have set us a worthy example. There must be a recognition of the fact that we are in God's hands in this great struggle. This has found outward expression in the United States and Britain and South Africa by the stopping of the wheels of industry for a moment at midday when the hearts of the people for a moment at least are raised to God in recognition of His hand in our lives.

There is an increasing feeling that the church of God is to have an unparalleled opportunity and therefore responsibility after the war. The speaker quoted the great leaders in the British navy and army and Parliament in line with his claim, that the situation present a call and challenge to the church for a great forward movement for a reconsecrated and rededicated church and a Christ-possessed land.

We must see to it that they who died shall not have died in vain. At this point Principal Gandier was presented and he proceeded at once to discuss the theme of the hour "The church and the war." His first sentence was this "Brethren we are hourly receiving glad news of glorious victory but we must pay the price. I have just come in from a sympathetic conference with my friend Dr. Rochester who has just received word of the death of his second son at the front."

Dr. Gandier intimated that this morning he would deal with the survey of home conditions. The committee on Home Missions and Social Service have conducted a preliminary survey; and later on a survey is to be made in conjunction with all other churches and the government to ascertain the exact conditions prevailing in our great land and then separately and together devise plans to
