DOMINION OF CANADA FIRST WAR LOAN

\$200,000,000

The Bank of Canada is authorized by the Minister of Finance to receive subscriptions for a loan to be issued for cash in the following terms:

3 1/4 Per Cent Bonds

To be Redeemed by Annual Drawings by Lot

as follows:

- 20% of the Loan on February 1, 1948 at 100.00
20% " " February 1, 1949 at 100.00
20% " " February 1, 1950 at 100.00
20% " " February 1, 1951 at 100.50
20% " " February 1, 1952 at 101.00

Issue Price: 100% and accrued interest.

The proceeds will be used by the Government to finance expenditures for war purposes.

Payment is to be made in full against delivery of interim certificates on or after February 1, 1940.

Principal and interest will be payable in lawful money of Canada. Interest will be payable without charge semi-annually at any branch in Canada of any chartered bank. The Bonds will be dated February 1, 1940.

Denomination of Bearer Bonds: \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000

The Minister of Finance may, at his discretion, authorize the Bank of Canada to accept applications to convert Dominion of Canada 3% Bonds maturing March 1, 1940, into an equal par value of additional bonds of the above issue. The 3% Bonds accepted for conversion will be valued at 100.17% and accrued interest to date of delivery.

Cash subscriptions and conversion applications may be made to the Bank of Canada, Ottawa, through any branch in Canada of any chartered bank or through any approved investment dealer or stock broker from whom copies of the official prospectus containing complete details of the issue may be obtained.

The Minister of Finance reserves the right to allot cash subscriptions in full or in part. Subscription lists will open at 9 a.m., E.S.T., on January 15, 1940, and will remain open thereafter for not longer than two weeks, but may be closed at any time at the discretion of the Minister of Finance, with or without notice.

Daily War Survey

(By The Canadian Press) German air activity in the last few days confirms earlier impressions that the Nazi authorities have not yet determined on a settled policy with respect to attacks on Great Britain which they can be expected to pursue to the bitter end.

Britain was promptly followed by a British attack in force points to a deliberate policy of retaliation on the part of the Royal Air Force. Apparently Great Britain is out to convince the Germans that she will return blow for blow keeping in mind the possibility of extensive German bombing raids on British cities.

Submarine attacks, after a short period of intensification have slackened off. While this is undoubtedly due in part to improvements in defence and to the sinking of a number of untested craft Germany's submarine fleet must have been ordered or permitted to reduce its activities.

So also with mine-laying. The marked decline in British and neutral losses from mines after a few terrifying days points to reduced activity on the part of the Germans in that direction.

The latest form of attack on shipping is by aircraft. Singularly enough in a few swift raids German aircraft aided by fighters which prevented British bombers from meeting them, scored the first notable success attributed to an air attack on shipping, sinking or disabling a number of British and Danish vessels.

Whether this burst of aerial activity marks the start of a consistent and long campaign or is simply another more or less experimental gesture leading up to the big devastating air assault on Great Britain forecast by Field Marshal Goering remains to be seen.

Still Leap Year In New Calendar

NEW YORK, Jan. 11—(CP)—This may be Leap Year to you but to Elisabeth Achelis, president of the World Calendar Association, it's just another horrible example.

Under the World Calendar system each year would start with January 1 a Sunday; each quarter would begin with a month of 31 days, other months having 30 days. An extra year-end day as an extra Saturday would end the year.

General Motors Honor Their Long Service Employees

OSHAWA, Jan. 5th — (Special) high-ranking General Motors officials also will attend. The Corporation's Executive group will be headed by Mr. Sloan, Mr. Knudsen and Charles P. Kettering, Vice-President in charge of research.

It will be the largest assemblage of veteran employees ever gathered in the history of General Motors, and will constitute one of the principal features of a huge program planned for the celebration of the 25,000,000th General Motors Car.

Employees who have been with the Corporation as far back as 1918 will be brought from Lansing, Flint, Pontiac and nearby communities where the manufacturing plants of Oldsmobile, Buick, Chevrolet and Pontiac Divisions are located, to join the veteran employees of the Cadillac-Lansing Division at Detroit and Fisher Body employees from various nearby cities.
