It pays to buy in this province. Hon. John Richards, Bideford, was among the passengers returning to the city on the mail train last evening.

Mrs. Bagnall, Charlottetown, and the Misses Bagnall were in the city yesterday and went to Montreal last evening.—Moncton Times, May 1.

The S. S. Caspacia arrived here yesterday morning at daybreak with a general cargo and lying at Pownal wharf. This is her first trip of the season. She left here yesterday morning for Pictou and returns today on her way to Montreal. She will also call at several ports along the coast.

It was learned by telephone last evening that the search for the body of the late John Tyrell, who was drowned recently at Murray Harbor, was continued yesterday without success. It was a very difficult day to work owing to the high winds prevailing and the coldness of the weather. The search will be continued today. The young man's father and uncle are on the scene.

A good deal of ice is reported around Murray Harbor and from telephone advices it is learned that so far the prospects for lobster fishing have been but poor. There are plenty of herring for bait but lobsters themselves are a scarce article.

The many friends in this city will regret to know that the illness of Austin Waite, Detention officer for the Children's Aid Society, is much more serious than was at first thought. Yesterday he underwent an operation for appendicitis in the P. E. I. Hospital and it was found that he is suffering from a specially severe attack.

The triennial meeting of the Supreme Court of the Independent Order of Foresters opened Tuesday morning in the Temple building in Toronto, with some 250 delegates present from all parts of the world. No business was transacted that morning beyond the merest routine. Important business in connection with the reorganization of the operating expenses of the order and the incident abolition of some of the high courts, will come before the convention. Horatio Nelson, Montague, is in attendance, the only delegate from this province, representing the High Court here.

Thomas Irving, Cambridge, Lot 63, a brother of the late Miss Bella Irving of that place, whose death some time ago has been a matter of interest all over the province, is said to have offered an explanation of her death yesterday. Mr. Irving is reported to have said that his sister, by reason of her age and of the weakened condition of her heart, had not been feeling well for quite a few days preceding her death. Shortly before the day of her demise her sister put her to bed and while no one was in the room she either fell out of bed or fell on the floor, from overtaxing her strength trying to get out. The people in the neighbourhood are said to be surprised that her death, apparently from natural causes, should have caused unpleasant rumors to be circulated involving the brother with whom she lived. It is not thought probable that an inquest will be necessary, and although Dr. Barnes, the local coroner, was in the vicinity yesterday to attend a sick call, it is understood that no steps toward holding an inquest were taken.

Why servants are hard to obtain. NEW YORK, April 29.—Many laborers are idle and labor agencies report conditions worse than last year said Herman Robinson, commissioner of licenses, in his report to the mayor made public today.

Wages have fallen below the prevailing rate of last year. The present spring is not nearly so good as the spring of 1910.

Mr. Robinson was formerly a well known labor leader. The demand for domestic servants grows more acute each year, says the commissioner and just now is more sharply felt in Canada than any other part of the continent.

The dependant status of household servants is responsible, he explains, and unless employers put them on the same footing as working women in other walks of life, the scarcity will continue.

STREETS OF PARIS FILLED WITH TROOPS

PARIS, May 1.—Detachments of troops occupied all the squares and open places of the city today in anticipation of the workingmen's May-day demonstration. Between 20,000 and 30,000 soldiers were under arms, but up to the late afternoon no disturbance had occurred. Less than half of the workingmen of the city observed the holiday. Some uneasiness had been caused, as it had been insisted that the Central Confederation of Labor would make a monster demonstration in defiance of the Government's refusal to sanction it. M. LePine, the Prefect of Police, was toward evening a crowd estimated at 250,000 gathered in the Place De Concorde and the adjacent streets. The greater number were sight-seers, but in the throng were many thousands inclined apparently to make a demonstration, and there were rough characters from other quarters of the city. The latter pressed into the square, resisting the Police and breaking through the line.

When the disturbers became more aggressive the Cavalry was summoned and charged into the crowd repeatedly. During the collision an officer was stabbed in the leg but his wound is not serious. One policeman was struck over the head with a club and rendered senseless. In the excitement several revolvers short were fired from the crowd but no one was hit so far as known.

Drives from the Place De Concorde small groups reassembled at other points but they were soon dispersed. Many manifestos received slight injuries. About 50 arrests were made.

THE TELEPHONE SAVED BROTHER'S LIFE

HUNTSVILLE, Ont., May 2.—A. M. Dewyer, of Toronto, the first tourist to reach the Lake of Bays this year, is suffering from an experience which would have cost him his life but for the utility of the telephone. Early yesterday morning Dewyer went fishing in a small canoe, and while half a mile from shore he capsized. Miss Sparks, of Bayview farm, was watching him through a pair of field glasses, and witnessing the accident rushed to the telephone and called her brother at Dorset. Mr. Langford, of the Alvira house, where Dewyer was staying, secured two men and put out in a boat. They rescued the angler when his condition was too exhausted for him to speak.

ORIGINAL BLOOMER WOMAN DEAD

VINELAND, N. J., May 2.—Susan P. Fowler, the original bloomer woman, is dead here at the age of 87 years. She donned bloomers 69 years ago.

TAKE FINGER PRINTS OF ALLEGED LOS ANGELES DYNAMITER

LOS ANGELES, May 2.—The chief detective of the district-attorney's office has taken prints from James B. McNamara's thumbs. The prints, it is said, will be sent to San Francisco in an effort further to identify him as J. B. Bryce, who it is alleged purchased dynamite with which to blow up the Times building.

Prints of all McNamara's fingers also were taken and these will be compared with the finger prints discovered by detectives on the launch Pastime, which is said to have been used by the alleged dynamiter in transporting the explosives purchased by them to San Francisco.
