Dead "Sulphur King" A Former Londoner

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 5.—The announcement in New York that Herman Frasch, "The Sulphur King," has left an estate of \$10,000,000 to be devoted to chemical research for the advancement of agriculture, recalls the fact that Frasch is a former Londoner, well known years ago to many people of this city and Petrolia. At the time London was the centre of the oil refining industry in Ontario and Frasch lived in the house now standing at the southwest corner of Dundas and William Streets. While here he invented a method of removing sulphur from unrefined oil and a process for making paraffine. His sulphur experiments laid the foundation of the huge fortune he afterwards accumulated in the United States.

Dr. C. E. Saunders, originator of Marquis wheat, the variety that has revolutionized grain growing in Canada, who has just returned from two years' study of French civilization in France, announced here today that he will devote himself in future to educational work for the betterment of relations between Canada and France. Dr. Saunders, for this reason, will not continue his research in agriculture.
