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Big Potato Crop In United States

Maine Production Likely To Be 22 Per Cent Above Average, With Expectations Of 8 Major Crop States Exceeding 1929 Production By 18 Per Cent.

BOSTON, July 17.—The July 1 estimate of 1930 plantings of potatoes totals 3,482,000 acres for the United States. This is an increase of 3.3 per cent over both the 1929 acreage and the previous five year average.

Present indications point to a United States crop totalling 398,419,000 bushels compared with 359,796,000 bushels the revised estimate of 1929 production and 392,605,000 bushels the average 1924-1928. The 1930 prospective crop is about 11 per cent larger than the 1929 crop and 2 per cent above the average.

Cabinet Ministers In Ontario Are All "Bottled Up"

Majority of Them Afraid to Leave Their Constituencies, Even for A Day—Liberal Casualty List Threatens To Be Very Large.

(Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, Ont., July 18.—Conservatives have successfully "bottled up" all the Cabinet Ministers in this Province. They all are seriously alarmed over the result in their constituencies and scarcely leave them for a day.

Feature Of Contest

The fight against the Cabinet Ministers is the most spectacular feature of the contest. When Cabinet Ministers, like Hon. J. C. Elliott in West Middlesex, and Hon. W. D. Euler in North Waterloo, dare not leave these, two of the strongest Liberal constituencies in the Province, there can be no doubt of the swing the casualty list of Ontario Ministers threatens to be very large.

"Money No Good"

In 1926 during the last three days of the fight the Liberal Party threw enormous sums into doubtful constituencies in the Western peninsula and won several, but in this election it is not believed money can beat sentiment.

King Thinks Conservative Leader Is Going To Win

Declares Bennett Is Now Trying To Avoid The Responsibility Of The Office Of Premier.

ESPANOLA, Ont., July 18.—A declaration that he believed Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative Leader, was seeking to find some excuse for not attending the Imperial Conference, if he is returned to power, was voiced here today by Premier Mackenzie King.

THE FLOWING TIDE

Mr. E. C. Buchanan, who writes parliamentary and political notes for the Independent Toronto Saturday Night, says of the present campaign:

Electoral opinion at the Capital seems to be swinging toward Mr. Bennett. One finds it indicated in informal election speculation on the part of politicians of both parties and others who are not politicians but who follow the race as a sport.

Up until the end of the first month of the campaign there was little indication of any trend of opinion or sentiment either way. In the Capital, those who were endeavoring to test the wind were fearful of a stalemate. They could not see either party securing a majority and they were apprehensive that the independent groups would again secure control of parliament and that another election at an early date would be necessary.

But a few days before the commencement of July the tide seemed to start to move against the government. Mr. Bennett's great speech at Maisonneuve appeared to be the signal for the beginning of the movement, or at least to synchronize with it.

Some there are who believe that, the wave having started, and the country having become aware that it has started, it will roll up rapidly and that there is a possibility of the government's being pretty well swamped on election day.

Steel Mills Of Sault Ste. Marie Are Closed Down

POSSELT GIVES EVIDENCE FOR THE DEFENCE

Trial At Georgetown Continued Today—Anti Will Take The Stand.
