Temperance Federation Takes Stand Against New Temperance Act

If the Provincial Government was as much in earnest in its efforts to enforce the Prohibition Act as the Dominion Government was in enforcing the Drug and Narcotics Act, there would be no liquor problem in Prince Edward Island, Rev. E. R. MacWilliam, field secretary of the Maritime Temperance Federation, told a special meeting of the Prince Edward Island Temperance Federation yesterday afternoon.

Those who say that the Prohibition Act cannot be enforced, Mr. MacWilliam maintained, always forget to mention that a good Prohibition Act badly administered is nevertheless better than a bad prohibitory law strictly administered.

"I may be wrong in my interpretation of the so-called new Temperance Act," Mr. MacWilliam said, "but it seems to imply that the doctors have not been honourable and honest in the issuing of their liquor prescriptions. I believe that in the main, they are honourable men. I would say that at least 70 per cent of the doctors are honourable. In the issuing of liquor prescriptions and the implication that they have been dishonest in this respect is not correct."

Mr. MacWilliam said that some time ago, the Montreal civic authorities made a determined effort to wipe out the red light districts of that City and that they had put a great number of women and girls in jail and had run the rest out of Montreal. If the authorities of that City, Mr. MacWilliam said, had followed the theory advanced by the Prince Edward Island Government, instead of putting the women in jail they would have increased their number in the red light district and invited all the men they could contact to patronize the district under the theory that the more business the women did, the more moral they would become.

Mr. MacWilliam said the question boiled down to this: "do you want liquor only sold as a medicine through a doctor's prescription, or do you want it sold as a beverage by a Commission?"

(Continued from Page 1) In the economic systems and ideologies. "It is possible to agree or disagree with the program of Mr. Wallace," Stalin said, "but one thing is, nevertheless, beyond doubt; there is no statesman for peace and co-operation among the peoples who can ignore this program, since it reflects the hopes and strivings of the peoples towards consolidation of peace, and it doubtless will have the support of millions of ordinary people."

Stalin denied the "inadequacy" of the recent diplomatic exchange of the two Governments. On May 4, Walter B. Smith, United States Ambassador in Moscow, conferred with Foreign Minister Molotov. Molotov replied May 9 that the Soviet Union was "in agreement" with an American proposal for "discussion and settlement" of mutual differences.

United States Government sources said later, however, that Smith had not issued an invitation to Russia for bi-lateral talks. Stalin halted Wallace's open letter with some reservations as the "most important document" concerning peace of recent times.

Stalin specifically identified Wallace as a "third party presidential candidate" and said Wallace's open letter offered "a concrete program for peaceful settlement" of differences between the United States and Russia. He said it "made a serious step forward."
