APPENDIX USEFUL TO POSTPONE OLD AGE

LONDON, January 7.—C. B. Keetley, in the Lancet continues his vindication of the character of the hiterto universally maligned vermiform appendix. He is publishing a paper read at the surgical section of the Royal Society of Medicine, which points out that Sir William MacEwen had demonstrated that the appendix has physiological uses of considerable importance. It is not a useless and merely vestigial organ, as has been reported. It possesses also a potential surgical value, which appears greater and more astonishing the more experience one gains in appendectomy. The author quotes Mitchell's suggestions that the appendix is useful in staving off or postponing the degeneracy of old age. Keetley urges in all cases transplantation instead of amputation. He says: "An appendix transplantation into the abdominal wall need not be used for appendectomy at the time, but it is there if it ever should be wanted."

He quotes two cases of perforative appendicitis which were merely trivial, as the appendices were securely imbedded in the abdominal wall.

stating how shamefully those laws are violated, and no paid wardens in the place to look after them—there is not as much done as formerly. Fishing out of season and letting are still carried on to a great extent in many places.

Those letters speak of head-lighting birds at night, and chasing large flocks with launches and firing rifle shots at long ranges. Those methods are known to be the worst means for driving birds away from our rivers and shores. We certainly have one of the best provinces in the Dominion for fish, game, and shell fish if properly cared for and I think the existing state of things, ought to be remedied by the attention on the part of the Government authorities. If the Dominion will not protect our fish and game let us demand that the inland fisheries be handed over to this province, then have government paid wardens all over, to do away with all poaching as much as possible, and if not exterminate, keep down at least to a certain extent, all birds which prey on and destroy our river and stream fish.

The best law we have in the interest of this province, for this class of birds which are worthless for food, is our taxidermists, who have them mounted, and shipped away bringing back in return good money. For our fish we have the year around. Those birds are here only till ice forms to destroy more young trout, salmon and other valuable fish than is caught with rod or gun.
