THE COST OF SPEED.

Comparatively few persons are aware of the great cost at which high speed of steamships is attained, and the same rule holds good in large measure in regard to railway trains. An interesting experiment was recently made by the British Government to determine what expenditure of power and fuel is required to increase the speed of a vessel over what might be considered her normal rate of progress. This trial was carried out in the new cruiser Highflyer.

At 12 1/2 knots 2,135 horse power was expended. To reach a speed of 20-1 knots 10,334 horse power was required, or nearly five times the power that was needed for 12 1/2 knots. The consumption of coal did not increase at quite so rapid a rate on the whole, but increased more rapidly at the higher rates of speed. Thus to increase the Highflyer's speed from 19.4 knots to 20.1—a gain of only seven tenths of a knot per hour—required an addition of more coal than was required to drive the cruiser at 12 1/2 knots.

There has been a vast improvement in marine steam engines within a comparatively few years. Were it not for this it would be impossible for the ocean grey hounds to make the speed they do. Under the old conditions the ocean steamer could not carry coal enough to force her across the Atlantic within the time now occupied in the voyage.

Among the witnesses against Dreyfus is Lebrun-Reynault, who swears that the prisoner confessed his guilt to him. But the story is a very improbable one. Reynault says another man overheard the confession, but the other man is dead. He says also that he told President Cassimir-Perier of the confession, but the ex-President says he was not told anything of the sort.

One of the matters thought to be worth cabling from Europe to America is that there are now 71 princesses of reigning families of marriageable age while there are in all the "off-shoot monarchies" but 47 princes who can reasonably be looked to for partnership in marriage. The fate of perpetual celibacy apparently awaits many of the princesses.

With all the sympathy that is felt for Dreyfus throughout the English-speaking world it is almost painful to read that the more respectable classes in France are all against him. Julian Ralph writes to a New York paper that it is the riffraff which makes up the body of the Dreyfusards. They include the Anarchists, Socialists, Nihilists, cranks and vagabonds of the of the country. It is added that the church dignitaries, the aristocracy and the bourgeoisie by a great majority still believe that Dreyfus is a traitor.

It is gratifying to learn that the meeting of a deputation from the Local Government with Sir Louis Davies and Hon. A. G. Blair at Mouton results in a definite understanding under which the construction of the Hillsboro Bridge and Belfast Railway will go on. There was a report that Premier Farquharson was endangering the enterprise by insisting upon conditions which it was now impossible for the Federal Ministers to concede. The Act for the construction of the bridge and railway stipulates the conditions on which the work shall be entered upon. It is too late for variations, unless the construction is to be delayed indefinitely.

A Boston paper comments on the contrast between the bathing regulations in England and America. "Over there a lady can't go into the water with her own husband, much less with anybody else's male relative." Canadian practice is American, rather than British.

Up to the beginning of the present year Millionaire Carnegie had given away \$5,000,000 to twenty-four colleges and libraries in the United States and England, including \$3,000,000 to the Carnegie Institute of Pittsburgh. During the year he has given \$250,000 to Birmingham University, and various other gifts for like purposes of \$25,000 to \$50,000 each. His public donations during the current year have been about \$1,500,000 in all. Andrew Carnegie was born at Dumfermline, Scotland, in 1837.

General Fitzhugh Lee, who is in command in western Cuba, thinks that the Island has made such good progress under military rule that it may very shortly be entrusted with self-government. He recommends the early establishment of an independent republican Government with a President and Congress elected by the Cubans. But he would continue for an indefinite time the occupation by United States troops, until the new Government is established on a stable basis.
