City School Board Report

The following report of the
Board of School Trustees was read
at the annual meeting of the City
Council.

The number of pupils enrolled
in December was as follows:—
Prince Street School—230 boys,
301 girls; total 531.
West Kent School—310 boys, 198
girls; total 508.
Queen Square School—661 boys,
total 661.
Rochford Square School—504
girls, total 504.
Total—2199.

The number of teachers employ-
ed was as follows:—
Prince Street School.....19
West Kent School.....20
Rochford Square School.....17
Queen Square School.....21
Total.....77

Manual Training Instructors..... 2
Total 79
The amount paid as supplements
to teachers' salaries was \$54,420.00
less deductions for teachers' pen-
sion system \$952.00 and income
tax deductions of \$4,000, or \$53,-
384.00 net.

At the entrance examinations in
June to Prince of Wales College,
Miss Marion Moore, a pupil of
West Kent School, made higher
marks than any other pupil in
the City, and was awarded a prize
of \$15.00 by the Board.

At the closing exercises in June,
the following pupils were awarded
the Governor General's Bronze
Medals for proficiency.
Prince Street School—Miss Carol
Marie Coles.
West Kent School—Miss Hilda
Pickard.
Queen Square School—Mr. John
Weir.

Rochford Square School—Miss

During the year in addition to
the regular repairs and decorat-
ions to the interior of the schools
a very considerable additional
amount became necessary. Just
as the schools were to open in
September, the brick casing of
the boiler at West Kent School
suddenly caved in, which required
a very considerable expenditure
for repairs. In addition it be-
came necessary to supply the fe-
male teachers of that school with
a rest room and proper toilet
facilities. Some additional expen-
ses were also necessary for changes
in class rooms on account of class
rooms being opened for special
pupils.

Early in the morning of the
21st of October, an unfortunate
fire took place in the boiler room
of West Kent School, due to heat-
ing of the coal. This caused an
additional expenditure of nearly
\$1500.00 up to the close of the year.
On account of the fire it was
necessary to close the school, and
the pupils attended Prince Street
School from one to five o'clock in
the afternoons until we were able
to re-open West Kent School on
November 3rd.

The interior of all four schools
are now in very good condition.

Manual Training

During the year Manual Train-
ing has been successfully carried
on at West Kent School under
the direction of Mr. LeBaron E.
Tait, who gave instruction to a
total of 231 boys from that school
and Prince Street School. Similar
satisfactory instruction was given
in Queen Square School by Mr.
Feroz Barlow to 248 boys of that
school. The boys attending these
classes are receiving great benefit.
During the months of April and
May, October and November in-
struction in Domestic Science was
carried on in the kitchen of Prince
Fullerton for 71 girls of grades 7
and 8 of Prince Street School, and
Miss Bessie Prowse for 60 girls of
grades 7, 8 and 9 of West Kent
School. At Rochford Square School
60 girls were given similar in-
struction in April and May by a
member of the teaching staff, and
during October and November a-
bout 70 girls received this instruc-
tion. This is a branch of educa-
tion in which the girls are greatly
interested, and which will be use-
ful to them in later years.

For some years there has been
a growing demand for special in-
struction of some pupils. During
the summer four teachers were
appointed and sent to a summer
school in Toronto, where courses
were taken in this branch of edu-
cation, and commencing in Sep-
tember this work has been carried
on with good success in each of
the four schools.
During the year instruction in
music in the four schools has
progressed. Seven and one half
hours instruction is given in all
four schools each week. The De-
partment of Education have as-
sisted financially in the develop-
ment of this important branch of
education.

Miss Ruth Ross, Public Health
Nurse, continued during the year
her work towards the improve-
ment of the health of the pupils.
At a large expense the Kines-
men's Club donated and had in-
stalled in each of the four schools
a radio and public address system
during the year. These installa-
tions have proved to be most use-
ful and worthwhile. The donors
have the thanks of the members
of the Board as well as that of
the teachers and pupils.

In June Dr. A. W. M. Allan was
re-appointed by the Government
a member of the Board for a term
of four years, and Mr. H. P. Mac-
Phee, B.A., K.C. was re-appointed
by the City for a term of five
years.
