**PATRICK CALLAGHAN**

Emyvale, Lot 30, is mourning the death of one of the oldest residents in the person of Patrick Callaghan who departed this life on the eve of November 11th, after a short illness of only a few days, at the ripe old age of 74 years.

Pat as he was familiarly known by both young and old enjoyed the respect and esteem of the whole community in which he spent his long life and his memory will long be remembered by those who knew him best, for his model christian life, his kind and affable disposition, his true sense of citizenship, his love of God and of neighbor, which rendered him upright and honest in all his dealings with his fellow men. **"We're Rich Again" At Prince Edward**

A fascinating, frivolous comedy with a pungent outdoor flavor and an outstanding cast of players is offered in the REG Radio society farce, "We're Rich Again," which opened yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre.

As the dashing stock speculator, Reginald Denny is his own convincing self, and he brings to his performance all the skill and sureness that has made him one of the most popular men on the screen today. Billie Burke as the society mother, Joan Marsh as one of her daughters, and Grant Mitchell as the father, are good in their respective roles, and Edna May Oliver contributes broad comedy as a dynamic polo-playing grandmother, known to her sporty cronies as "three-goal Maude."

Color is lent to the outdoor giving by the expert swimming and diving of Buster Crabbe, Olympic champion, who plays the part of the college athlete who elopes with the younger daughter.

It was then that the rapier whirled from the swordsman's grasp, pierced her fore-arm and cut her fingers. As soon as she had finished the scene Miss Tempest's arm and fingers were bound.

**Marina's Parents Return To Their Studio In Paris**

PARIS, Dec. 6.—The wedding of their daughter Princess Marina, to the Duke of Kent, over, Prince and Princess Nicholas returned to Paris, the Prince to go back to his palace and easel.

Curious art enthusiasts who look for his paintings, however, are apt to miss them unless they are familiar with the pseudonym "Nicholas le Prince."

A descendant of the reigning house of Denmark, one of the oldest in Europe, and of the Romanoff house of the Russian Tsars, Prince Nicholas found few outlets for his talents and energy left when Greece exiled him in 1924, the year the Greek Republic was proclaimed.

Came to Paris

He came to Paris, art capital of Europe and time-honored haven of refugees, where his elder brother, Prince George, had married Princess Marie Bonaparte, and took up painting.

Unlike many princes, those of Greece were not wealthy, and it is no secret Nicholas had to watch his expenditures carefully after his nephew, King George II. of Greece, was deposed.

Nor could his wife, Grand Duchess Helen of Russia, contribute much financially to the family exchequer, for she previously had lost much of her fortune along with her ancestral home in Russia.

The tall, slender, aristocratic figure of Prince of Greece and Denmark, frequently was to be seen, therefore, standing at some street corner waiting for an omnibus to take him to his modest apartment or studio.

Grand Duchess Helen, daughter of Grand Duke Vladimir and cousin of the late Tsar Nicholas II, is active in charities despite the family reverses, particularly in behalf of the thousands of Russian refugees in Paris. She sponsors an annual ball in one of the smart hotels for the benefit of Russian children orphaned by the revolution.

Wed 32 Years Ago

She is 52 years old, the Prince 62. They were married 32 years ago at Tsarskoe Selo, Russia. Prince Nicholas' father was King George I. of Greece, who had been Prince William of Denmark before he took the Greek throne, and his mother was Grand Duchess Olga of Russia, cousin of Helen's father, Vladimir.

Their oldest daughter, Princess Olga, is the wife of Prince Paul of Yugoslavia, Regent of Yugoslavia since the assassination of his cousin, King Alexander I.

Their other daughter, Princess Elisabeth, who is two years older than Marina, lives with her parents in Paris.
