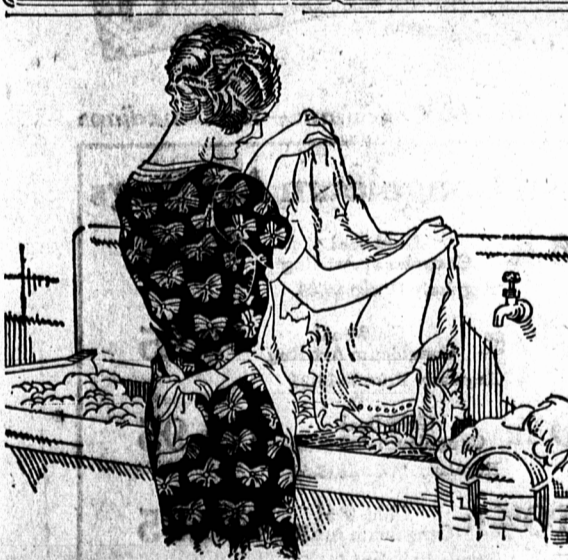

Farm lands have depreciated somewhat in value. Mr. MacKenna is being employed as farmer for Mr. Saunders, of the firm of Saunders and Newson and will be in charge of Mr. Saunders' farm on St. Peter's Road, near Charlottetown.

Mr. Howatt last season had about thirty acres under seed potatoes, and is planning this year on an acreage of more than forty acres. As he cannot give the proper attention and time to caring for milk cows and seed potatoes he is selling off at his milk cows except one so that he may specialise on potato growing. This year he is purchasing fourteen hundred dollars worth of fertilizer for growing puds. It seems a loss to have this to change from mixed farming by selling off one's dairy herd. Some of Mr. Howatt's milk cows sold for more than \$50, while good fat young cattle realised around forty. Mr. Edison Mabee, of Tryon was the capable auctioneer. We wish Mr. Howatt and others of the same ambition all success in their new venture. We regret that the growing of certified seed potatoes is lessening the number of valuable dairy herds in this province. Mixed farming on the whole may be the safer to follow, as it supplies the greater variety of what is needed, especially for our home markets. So long as the price for seed potatoes remains high and early shipments can be made before the heavy frosts come, the prospects for large returns in this new venture in farming are good. The risk may be greater in growing a special product, yet there is an attractive side to the undertaking which strongly appeals to our ambitious and progressive farmers.
