Premier King Sends Message To County Electors

Telegram from Hon. MacKenzie King to B. Graham Rogers, President East Prince Liberal Assn., Summerside.

I thank you for your wire advising me of the passing of our friend MacLean. I have wired expression of my sympathy to Mrs. MacLean. I should be grateful if you would convey to electors of Prince County the expression of my very sincere sympathy in the loss the constituency has sustained in the passing of one who has served its interests so faithfully and for so long. My colleagues in the government will I know wish to join with me in expressing our sense of the loss occasioned the party both in Parliament and in the country by Mr. MacLean's death. His able support of the party's principles and policies and the careful attention he gave to the interests he represented in Parliament will be gratefully remembered by all to whom they were known. I much regret that my public duties will render it impossible for me to be present at the funeral on Tuesday; had this been as all possible I should have welcomed the opportunity of paying this tribute to the memory of our late friend and to express in person my sympathy to the members of the constituency which also so greatly honoured me with its representation at the time of my appointment to the leadership of my party. Unfortunately as you are no doubt already aware apart from other pressing obligations it has been arranged that I am to be in Summerside on Tuesday evening. I should like my friends in the constituency to know that but for these reasons I would be present with them at the funeral Tuesday afternoon. My best regards.

Canadian Dollar Holds Steady Level

NEW YORK, Oct. 28—(AP)—The pound sterling had a hard time getting its bearings in Saturday's foreign exchange dealings. Although never fluctuating very far from the previous close, the unit bobbed uncertainly most of the session to finally close with a loss of 1/2 cent in terms of the dollar. The French franc lost .00 1-4 of a cent and the Belg. .02 of a cent. Unchanged were the Swiss franc and Guilder. The Canadian dollar was unchanged at a discount of 10 3/16 per cent.
