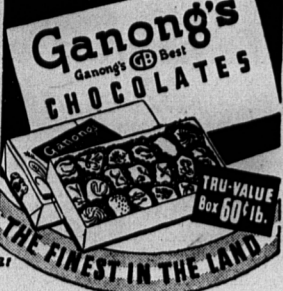

Gov't to give Information on War effort

OTTAWA, Nov. 3 — (CP) — The government, Prime Minister Mackenzie King told the House of Commons today, wants to answer during the present meeting of Parliament any questions the Opposition may choose to ask and give the country information it wishes regarding the Canadian war effort.

When this has been done, he told the Commons after members resumed the adjourned session, he will move adjournment to a date early in the new year after which a new session of Parliament will start.

Approximately 75 per cent of the members were in attendance to hear the Prime Minister review war developments since adjournment last June. When he had concluded the House rose until tomorrow when Conservative House leader Hanson will reply.

"While this is the end of the second session of the present Parliament the government has no desire to terminate the session before the honorable gentlemen opposite, as well as those on this side (of the House) wish to have it terminated," said the Prime Minister.

"We are here to answer any questions which the Opposition may wish to ask the government; to give to the country information which we believe the country will wish to have at this stage, with regard to the progress of Canada's war effort and also to give information on other public matters as to which honorable members or the country may wish to be informed."

It was the general wish of members that Parliament should be kept in session so that it would be present and the end of the year a critical situation arose members could be called together quickly.

Between today's adjournment and tomorrow's session the party leaders will work out the procedure for the balance of the session to the end of that work will be facilitated.

Mr. Hanson asked why it was that when members had been away from Ottawa for four months, there was no legislation ready for Parliament.

He believed private members should be given something more to do than they had been given in the past.

"Parliament has really been reduced in status that of a debating society," he said. "So far as the executive is concerned, it would appear that the only procedure required is to call together from time to time to pass such supply as they may require."

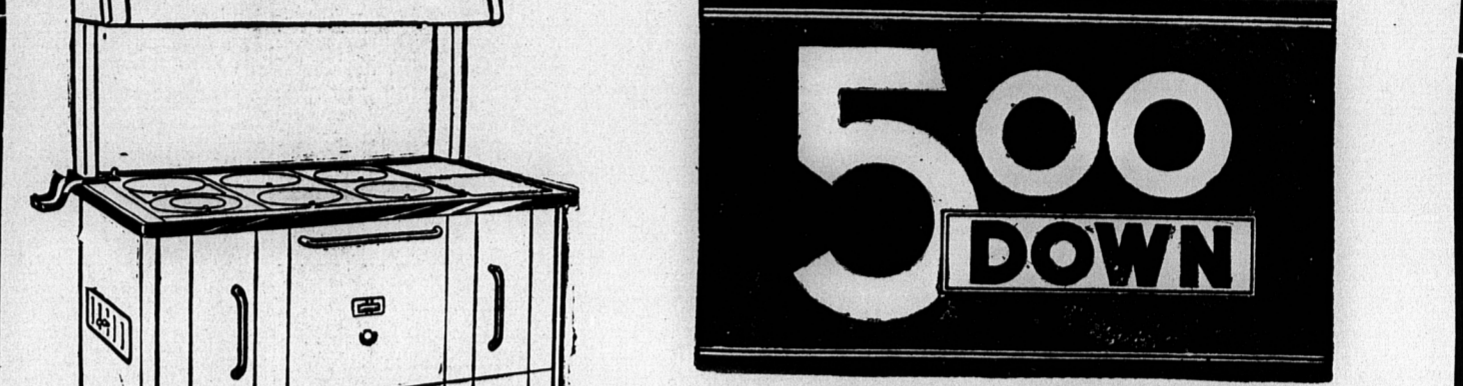
"My main object in making this statement is that of stating that the people's elected representatives are still the people and that while we have delegated all kinds of authority to the government, it does not follow that the people's elected representatives have given to this or any other government carte blanche to do as it pleases by order-in-council."

E. G. Hansell, acting leader of the New Democracy, said he believed Parliament was to sit and adjourn until a certain time again and again there should be some time given during the year to private members in order to discuss things which perhaps could only be presented by a private member.

Angus MacInnis, acting leader of the C. C. F., held it would be a "calamity" if members were to be denied the opportunity of discussing questions which are so foremen in the minds of the people of Canada.

HALIFAX, Nov. 3 - (CP) - Tenders will be called shortly for a large radio station for the Royal Canadian Air Force at nearby Preston, the Halifax board of trade disclosed today.
