CROP REPORT

WINNIPEG, Man. 11—Wheat is rapidly coming into head throughout Western Canada with the full effects of June heat and drought now showing in many sections of Saskatchewan and Alberta.

The most seriously affected areas are found in western and northern Saskatchewan and in the Edmonton division in Alberta. With moderating temperatures and recent general showers most districts report crops holding up well and many showing decided improvement.

With the exception of some considerable territory in southwestern Saskatchewan the larger wheat acreages in southern districts of the three provinces give promise of excellent yields, according to the weekly crop of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

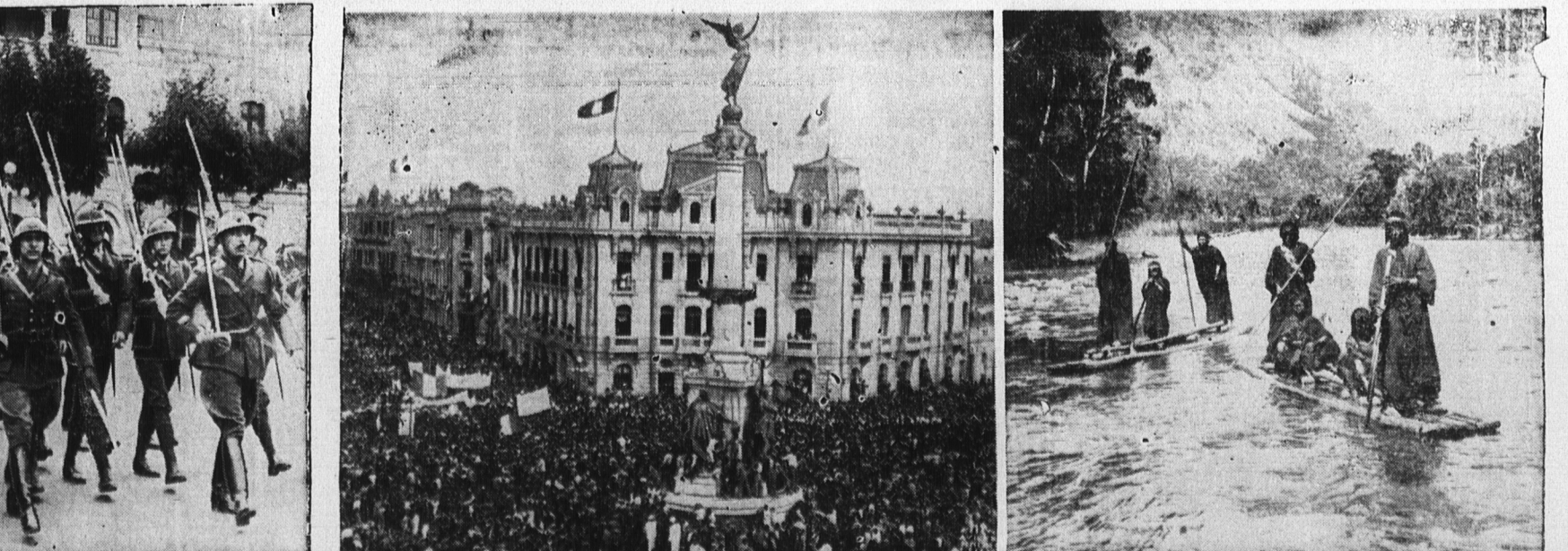

Border War Breaks Out Between Peru and Ecuador



Latest theatre of war is the border area of Ecuador and Peru, where a century-old frontier dispute has flared up once more. At left are Peruvian troops marching through the streets of Lima. Their artillery is reported to have shelled three Ecuador border towns. Crowds gathered in Lima square a word of the fighting came in, waving flags and cheering (CENTRE). The Peruvians claim Equadoran forces tried to cross the frontier and were beaten back. Peru's forces are reported to outnumber their enemies in the fighting zone. Peopled by Indians (RIGHT), is the frontier area in dispute. Peruvian bombers have raided jungle cities, and land, sea and air forces are said to be engaged. Ecuador claims Peru is the aggressor.
