TEA IN TABLET FORM

The London Tea Planters have recently received the first "tea tablets" which should considerably simplify and shorten the production of tea. They are the result of a process based on 100 years of experiments carried out by the Ceylon Tea Research Institute which reduces the time required in producing tea from 24 hours to 2 hours by means of this process—known as "P.C."—the tea is made into compressed tablets which saves shipping space 75 per cent. stronger than tea in its present form and allows for a reduction in price. The London organization is now going to undertake further tests and experiments with the tea tablets.

the east coast of the island where there is a hospital under the charge of Dr. Gordon Gaulton of Saint John, N. B.

It is these supplies that Sgt. Ldr. D. S. Florence of Westmont, Que., will drop by parachute when he helps to lift his plane from an Ottawa air base. He will pull down en route at Goose Bay, Labrador.

The supplies will be used to combat what officials said was believed to be for the Baffin Island area the first epidemic of typhoid, an infectious fever caused by "Bacillus typhosus" and liable to appear in epidemic proportions in any part of the world.

Lacking in Baffin Island probably would be the modern methods of sanitation that have done much to curb the disease in other parts of the world. Typhoid normally strikes persons between 15 and 35 years of age, is spread by contact with the sick from polluted soil, food and drink, particularly milk and water.

General Trend Of Farm Wages Up

OTTAWA, Oct. 1 (CP)—The general trend of Canadian farm wages is continuing higher, with daily rates with board averaging \$3.56 at Aug. 12 against \$3.53 a year ago, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The average wages per month, with board provided, showed substantial increases over August, 1944 in all provinces except the continued demand for steady help, and the average advance from \$85.99 in 1944 to \$111.88.

The largest increases occurred in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. New Brunswick also had the highest average wage with board at \$90.83. Saskatchewan and Alberta followed, while Prince Edward Island and at \$75.25 had the lowest.

The highest average wage without board, at \$111 per month occurred in Alberta with New Brunswick next, followed closely by British Columbia and Saskatchewan. Prince Edward Island again being lowest with a wage rate of \$78.25.

BLACKPOOL, Oct. 1 (CP)—A lost property office equipped with babies' feeding bottles, toy chairs, toys and games instead of shelves for coats has been opened by the Blackpool police for lost children.

Hair-Raising Details Given Of Mass Murder

LUENEBURG, Germany, Oct. 1 (AP)—A detailed account of the diabolically efficient mass murder methods used at the Oswiecim concentration camp—where victims stood in long lines waiting to die—was given today to the British military court trying 45 Nazis for their part in the mass murder of Jews in Poland.

Dr. Sigismund Charles Bendell, slight, dark Romanian Jew arrested in Paris because he failed on one day to wear the prescribed star of David, testified that 30,000 Jews were in one night in 1944.

Prompted occasionally by questions from counsel and members of the court, Dr. Bendell described the four crematoriums and the "bunker" supplemental arrangements overhauled in the vast trenches in which piles of corpses were burned on wood soaked in gasoline.

"I treated one man whose feet had been burned in hot human fat," the physician said in his tired voice. "The fat was run off in ditches."

A special detail of 900 prisoners, of whom he was one, was assigned to the death factory to carry bodies from the gas chambers to the crematoriums, keep the place "clean" and refuse to let successive victims, Dr. Bendell testified.

The first day he worked there, he said, he arrived to find the bunkers still smoldering from their last discharge—30,000 Jews, the entire population of the ghetto at Lodz, Poland, who were killed and burned as fast as they could be pushed through.

"A crematorium could burn 1,000 a day," he testified. "The trench could burn 1,000 an hour." At noon of this first day, the witness said, "a transport of between 800 and 1,000" victims arrived. He said he saw them undressed in the courtyard and herded into a vast hall. They were told they were going to get baths and then hot coffee, he said.

Five minutes later containers of gas arrived in a Red Cross ambulance, he went on. Victims first to enter realized what was happening and tried to get out. They were panic seized the entire crowd.

"They were forced with blows into the room," Dr. Bendell said. "There was shouting, crying and knocking on the wall. This lasted for two minutes—then came the gas. Five minutes later the doors opened, but only after 20 minutes can the special workers get the room to remove the bodies."

Asked who was in charge of the camp at the time, Dr. Bendell named Josef Kramer—later to be hanged for his brutality at the second camp.

"The witnesses today included pretty Anita Laska," he said. "In the summer of 1944 there were so many prisoners arriving night and day that there were queues of persons waiting for the crematorium" and Som Polinski, young Polish Jew who said Kramer shot to death two women he found taking rotten potatoes from the ground near the cookhouse.

Miss Laska testified that she played the cello in an orchestra that occasionally entertained the prisoners. The victims were being hauled off to the death house.

Mr. Fair spoke on his resolution which said that veterans who settled on land under the settlement scheme, as well as their wives and families, have in many instances suffered severe hardships because of purchase of land, livestock and equipment at inflationary prices, and low prices received for farm products brought about by a lack of adequate policy for agriculture.

Because of these facts the veterans had fallen in arrears in their payments and the interest on the money borrowed from the Government immediately jumped from five to seven per cent.

Up to March 31, 1944, cancellations and administration costs under the settlement act totalled \$28,208,537. Collections in capital and interest totalled only \$75,889,563.

The amount still owed by the veterans was about \$60,000,000, but at the rate of cancellations and administrative costs the Government would be saving money by granting the clear titles and winding up the affairs of the Soldiers' Settlement Board.

Because of the treatment received from the Government only about 25 per cent of the soldier settlers still were on the land.

TOKYO, Oct. 1 (AP)—American investigators set out today on the trail of the treasure which Japan looted from conquered lands, and also delved into the state region of Shintoin which was used to foster fanaticism and war.

In Tokyo the great Bank of Japan was closed. Army authorities declared it could reopen tomorrow if its officials quit stalling and helped track down the stolen riches of Asia.

The little people of Japan, who crowded about the bank, fearful said, was a second one into the Japanese educational system, designed to discover just how history now is being taught.
