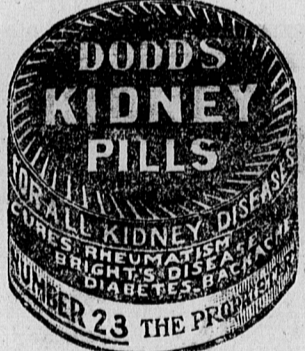

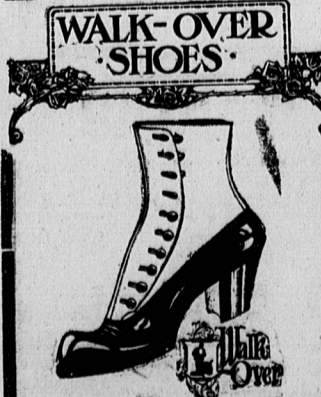

THREE IN FAMILY IN PACT TO DIE BY GAS

ATLANTA CITY, N. J., Nov. 21—Rather than be again torn from her mother or return to the household drudgery her childish shoulders had wearily borne as the charity inmate of a Camden home, Dora Adams, fourteen years old, joined Mrs. Annie Adams who is separated from her husband, in a determined effort to end not only their own lives, but that of Herbert Adams, the three year old child of the woman. A letter written by Dora to her father and found when the police broke into a room in a Tennessee avenue boarding house this morning, was a pitiful protest of the child against her fate.

Mrs. Adams, who had been living in McKeesport, has been tortured by separation from her little daughter and by the latter's sad little letters from the Camden home in which she was placed by a charity society of Shippensburg, home of Nicholas Adams, the father. Once the child escaped and returned to her mother, but the authorities sent her away again. The distress of Mrs. Adams became unbearable yesterday and she took her son with her to Camden.

Dora leaped at her mother's proposal that she would run away, and the three came to Atlantic City on the last electric train from Camden last night.

On the way it was learned today, mother and daughter wept together over their unhappy lot, and grew utterly despondent of ever bettering it. They agreed that it would be best for them and for the baby to shake off lives that seemed to hold nothing but pain and sorrow. On their arrival here they took a room in the first small boarding house they could find.

Mrs. Adams had provided herself with a bottle of chloroform. When their room door was locked, the boy Herbert, worn out with his travels, fell instantly into sleep. His mother and sister carefully plugged the crevices of door and windows with strips of their clothing torn up for this purpose, until they had made the room practically airtight. Then they hunted a bed spread over the window, and the girl climbed on a chair to fasten her overskirt across the transom.

All was ready for the last act in their tragic preparations, but the child suddenly announced that she must first write to her father. This note was found pinned to her skirt.
